RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, on January 29, 2025, four-time national champion and long-serving Nebraska Volleyball Head Coach John Cook, the winningest Division I volleyball coach of the century, announced his retirement, concluding a remarkable 32-year collegiate coaching career, including 25 years leading the Huskers; and

WHEREAS, under his leadership, Nebraska Volleyball earned four NCAA national championships (2000, 2006, 2015, 2017), 12 NCAA Semifinal appearances, eight NCAA Finals appearances, and 14 conference titles; and

WHEREAS, with 883 career victories, including 722 at Nebraska, Coach Cook holds the fifth-most wins in NCAA history and boasts the best win percentage of any Division I volleyball program over the past 25 years; and

WHEREAS, during his tenure, Nebraska Volleyball produced 72 AVCA All-Americans, 25 Academic All-Americans, five Olympians, and earned the Honda-Broderick Cup, the highest honor in women's collegiate athletics; and

WHEREAS, Coach Cook was named AVCA National Coach of the Year three times, conference Coach of the Year eight times, received the USA Volleyball All-Time Great Coach Award, and was inducted into the AVCA Hall of Fame in 2017; and

WHEREAS, throughout his sensational career, Coach Cook matched on-court success with a vision that extended far beyond trophies—raising the national profile of Nebraska Volleyball while advancing academic achievement and athletic excellence; and

WHEREAS, Coach Cook led Nebraska Volleyball's move to the Bob Devaney Sports Center, transforming the fan experience and building a record-setting sellout streak that reflects the unmatched passion of Husker Nation; and

WHEREAS, under his leadership, Nebraska Volleyball built a fan base and culture unrivaled in women's sports—culminating in Volleyball Day in Nebraska, when 92,003 fans filled Memorial Stadium, setting a world record for attendance at a women's sporting event; and

WHEREAS, through bold vision and his enduring mantra to "Dream Big," Coach Cook expanded Nebraska Volleyball into a national model—elevating the program and inspiring others to pursue excellence without limits; and

WHEREAS, he brought his team and the sport to all corners of the state, with spring matches from Norfolk to Ogallala, outreach to young athletes, and a commitment to making Husker Volleyball a shared point of pride for Nebraskans everywhere; and

WHEREAS, originally from coastal California, Coach Cook came to embody the spirit of Nebraska—building meaningful connections across the state, embracing a persona rooted in humility, hard work, and pride in the land and its people, earning him endearment as "Cowboy Cook" by fans near and far; and

WHEREAS, Coach Cook's leadership was grounded not just in on-court strategy, but in all around character—marked by steadiness, humility, and a continual drive to grow, adapt, and lead with integrity; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of his enduring contributions, Husker Athletics has honored Coach Cook with the naming of John Cook Arena at the Bob Devaney Sports Center, and the installation of a bronze statue in his likeness, ensuring his legacy will continue to inspire for generations; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska extends its deepest appreciation to Coach John Cook for a career that has transformed Nebraska Volleyball into a national powerhouse, strengthened communities across the state, and elevated the visibility and value of women's athletics; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Board celebrates the extraordinary vision and legacy of a coach, teacher, and lifelong learner—who has led not only a team, but inspired a state through volleyball, and showcased the very best of Nebraska on the national stage.

Following a 2023 in-depth review of UNK's Industrial Technology programs, the department engaged in a strategic effort to align the academic offerings and enhance overall program enrollment. The deletion is part of a strategic effort to align the department's offerings with minimum graduation requirements while enhancing overall program enrollment. The degree is not a destination major and is used primarily by students who do not fit into one of the other ITEC majors or who don't want to complete the formal internship that is required for all ITEC majors other than the Bachelor of Science in Industrial Technology.

This course of action has received full support from the Dean and the Department Chair, as well as my endorsement. Additionally, the recommendation has been thoroughly reviewed and approved by the Academic Affairs Committee.

PURPOSE & KEY POINTS

This MS in Horticulture has not met the minimum requirements set by CCPE, and therefore the department requests to discontinue it as a standalone program. The department further proposes to rename the MS in Agronomy to the MS in Agronomy and Horticulture. The proposed renaming reflects both academic and industry trends in the fields of agronomy and horticulture, which are interconnected disciplines. Both the department and the Ph.D. program names already reflect both disciplines. and this renaming seeks to align the Master of Science with the Ph.D. program. This will allow a unified identity and simplify recruitment without impacting academic rigor or employment opportunities for graduates. Horticultural curricular content will be available within the renamed MS degree, mirroring the structure of the PhD program.

The University of Nebraska's Graduate College's Executive Graduate Council voted to recommend the elimination of the stand-alone MS in Horticulture degree on June 17, 2025.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Section 2.9 of the Bylaws of the Board of Regents provides that, "No curriculum leading to a degree or certificate shall be ...discontinued without the approval of the Board."

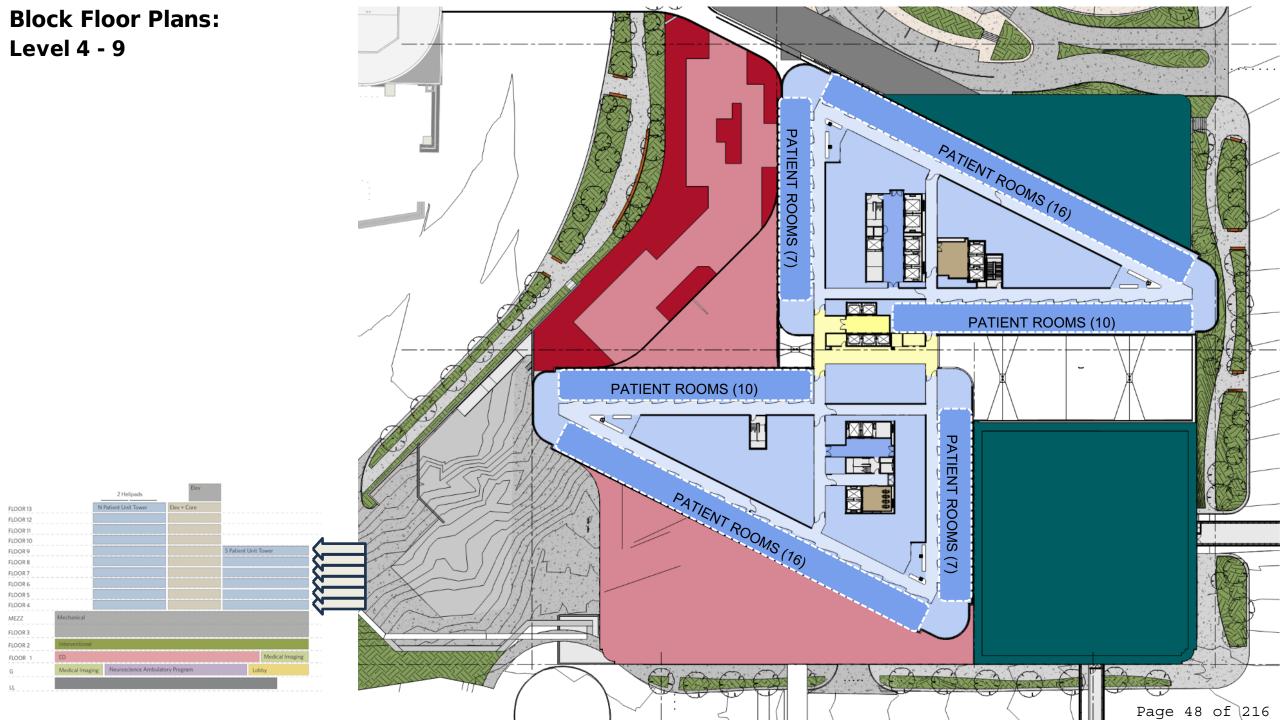




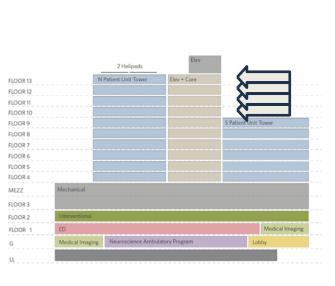


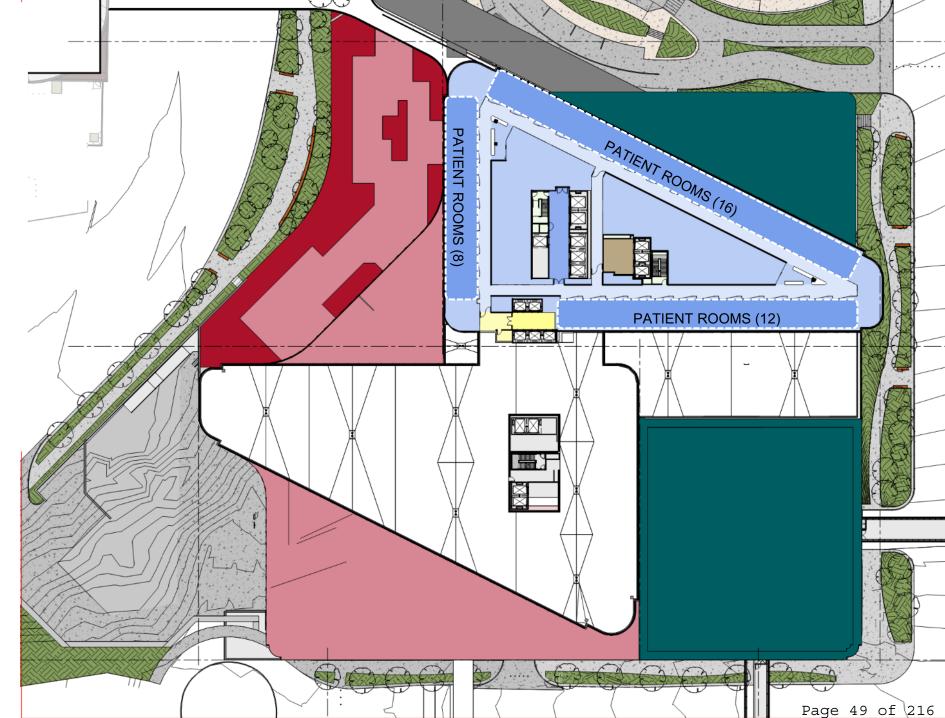




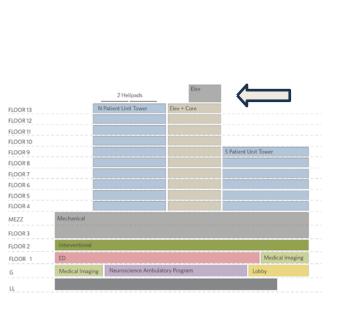


Block Floor Plans: Level 10 - 14

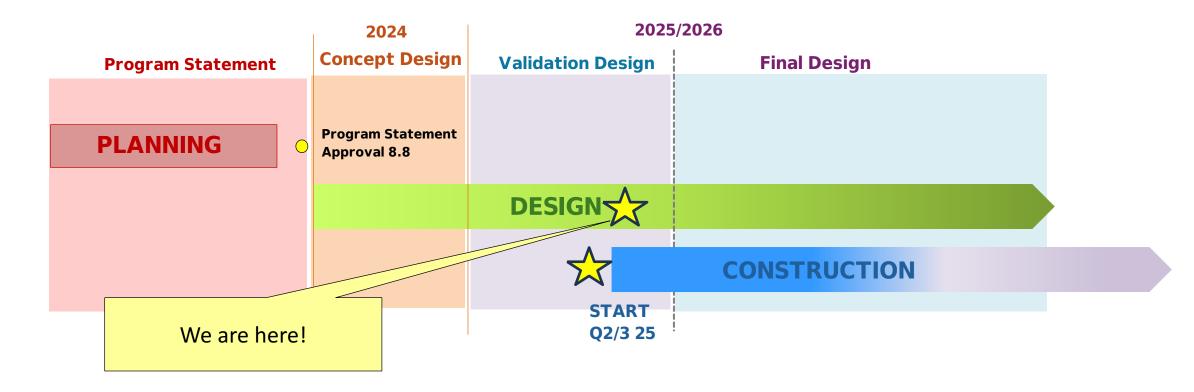

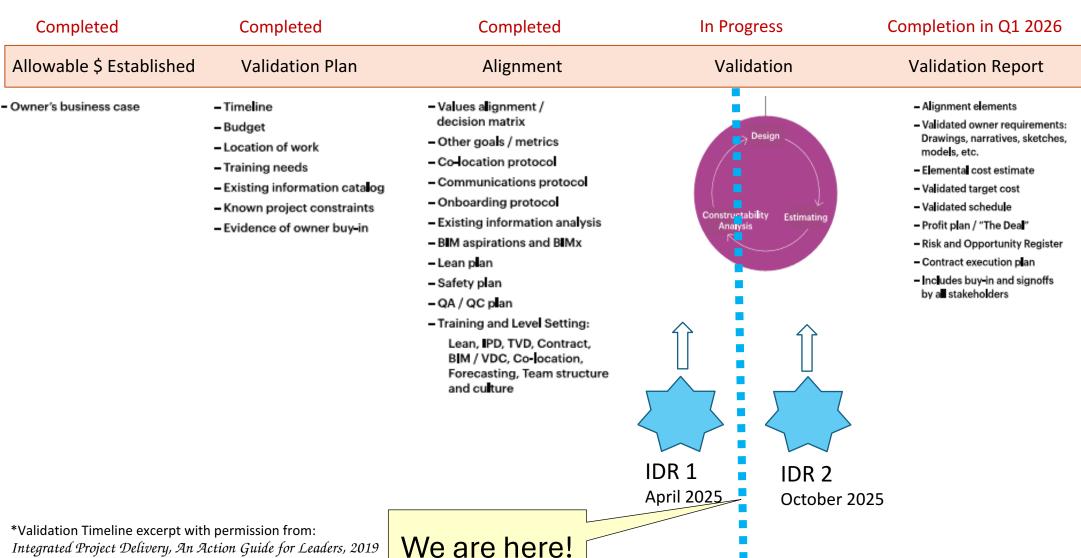

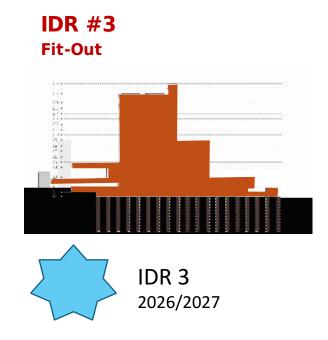

Chapter 6. Business and Financial Management

RP-6.3 Contracts

RP-6.3.1 Administrative Approval of University Contracts

1. Policy References

- Bylaws, section 2.4, relating to the responsibilities of the Senior Vice President for Business and Finance and CFO.
- b. Bylaws, section 6.1, relating to University obligations.
- c. Bylaws, section 6.4, relating to delegation of authority to the CEO/President to approve and execute certain types of Contracts.
- d. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 13-801 to -827, relating to interlocal cooperation.
- e. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 73-201 to -204, relating to contingent fee contracts.
- Neb. Rev. Stat. § 81-8,305, relating to where contract actions against the University may be initiated.
- g. Neb. Const. art. V, § 22, relating to the state of Nebraska's ability to sue and be sued.
- h. Neb. Const. art. XIII, § 1, relating to contracting of debts by the state of Nebraska.

2. Purpose

The purpose of this RP-6.3.1 is to specify procedures for approval of Board of Regents Contracts and delegate authority to the CEO/President and employees designated by the CEO/President to approve and execute certain types of Contracts. Any authority to approve and execute Contracts that is not delegated pursuant to this RP-6.3.1 or the Bylaws is retained by the Board of Regents.

Contract Term

When the length of a Contract's term is relevant to the delegation of authority provided for in this RP-6.3.1, the Contract's entire potential length shall be determinative, e.g. if a Contract has an initial term of ten years with an option to renew for an additional five years, then for purposes of this RP-6.3.1, the term of the Contract is deemed to be fifteen years. A Contract involving the expenditure or receipt of University funds shall not have a Contract term for an unspecified or unlimited duration unless approved by the Board of Regents.

4. CEO/President's Administrative Authority to Approve and Execute Contracts

Pursuant to section 6.4 of the Bylaws and, when applicable, subject to Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 73-201 to -204, the CEO/President shall have authority to approve and execute:

- a. Any Contract with a public utility or similar organization for the purchase of public utility services used in the operation of the University.
- Any Contract for the Purchase of fuels used in the operation of the University.

- c. Any Contract relating to the staging, performance, or sponsorship of any cultural, performing arts, recreational, or intercollegiate athletic activity.
- d. Any Contract for the Purchase of construction services which does not exceed \$7,500,000. All such executed Contracts in excess of \$1,500,000 shall be reported to the Board of Regents at its next regular meeting.
- e. Any Contract of any nature, not otherwise described in this chapter; provided that the Contract does not exceed \$7,500,000. All such executed Contracts in excess of \$1,500,000 shall be reported to the Board of Regents at its next regular meeting.
- f. Any amendment of or change order to a Contract approved by the Board of Regents and not otherwise described below in RP-6.3.1.4.g or .s that, when aggregated with all other amendments or change orders to that Contract, does not exceed the greater of \$250,000 or 1.25% of the amount of the Contract originally approved by the Board of Regents.
- g. Any amendment of or change order to a Contract for the Purchase of construction services that, once amended, exceeds \$7,500,000 provided such amendment or change order does not exceed the greater of \$1,000,000 or 1.25% of the Total Project Cost.
- h. Any Contract for the Purchase of Professional Services, except the Professional Services of an architect, engineer, landscape architect, or land surveyor, which does not exceed \$3,000,000. All such executed Contracts in excess of \$1,500,000 shall be reported to the Board of Regents at its next regular meeting. Any contract with an accounting/auditing Contractor, regardless of dollar amount, must be approved by the Audit, Risk, and Compliance Committee.
- i. Any Contract for the Purchase of the Licensed Professional Services of an architect, engineer, landscape architect, or land surveyor, where the Contractor has been selected in accordance with RP-6.3.2.
- j. Any Contract granting to a party a lease or license to use University Real Property, provided (1) the Contract term does not exceed twenty years, or (2) the total aggregate rent or license fee payable over the Contract term does not exceed \$7,500,000. All such executed Contracts in excess of \$1,500,000 shall be reported to the Board of Regents at its next regular meeting.
- k. Any Contract for or grant of an easement encumbering University Real Property where the value of the encumbrance of the easement and associated damages does not, in the judgment of the University, exceed a value of \$2,000,000. All such executed Contracts in excess of \$1,000,000 shall be reported to the Board of Regents at its next regular meeting.
- I. Any Contract granting a license or assigning the right to grant a license in any University technology as part of the transfer of such technology for commercial purposes, provided that an annual written report of all such Contracts shall be made to the Board of Regents.
- m. Any Contract of employment that the CEO/President or his or her designee is authorized to approve in accordance with section 3.2 of the Bylaws.
- n. Any Contract relating to the Acquisition or Disposal of Real Property that the CEO/President is authorized to approve in accordance with RP-6.2.3.
- o. Any Contract relating to acceptance of a gift or grant that the CEO/President or a CAO/Chancellor is authorized to accept in accordance with RP-6.6.7.

- p. Any Contract related to a research agreement, including subawards, and associated agreements routinely used in the operation of the University.
- q. In consultation with the Chair of the Board of Regents, any Contract and all other documents as may be required in connection with the issuance of indebtedness to refund outstanding indebtedness, including, without limitation, lease obligations. The refund shall be reported to the Board of Regents at its next regular meeting.
- r. Any Contract for interlocal cooperation authorized under Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 13-801 to -827 that does not exceed \$7,500,000; create or delegate power to any separate legal or administrative entity; involve establishment or maintenance of a joint budget; involve the levying of, collection of, or accounting for taxes; involve the issuance or refund of bonds; establish a joint board or administrator responsible for administering the Contract; or involve the acquisition, holding, or disposal of real or personal property. All such executed Contracts in excess of \$1,500,000 shall be reported to the Board of Regents at its next regular meeting.
- s. Any Contract, including any amendment or change order to such Contract, (1) that is related to a project or Stage approved by the Board of Regents under RP-6.3.6.2.e and (2) that, when aggregated with all other Contracts related to that project or Stage, does not exceed, as applicable, the approved Total Project Cost or Total Stage Cost.
- t. Any Contract relating to the disposal of Personal Property when such disposal does not require approval by the Board of Regents under RP-6.2.2.
- 5. Delegation of CEO/President's Authority to Approve and Execute Contracts

The CEO/President may delegate authority to approve and execute Contracts, as specified above in this RP-6.3.1.4, to other employees of the University. Such delegation or change to an existing delegation of authority shall be made in writing, signed by the CEO/President, and reported to the Audit, Risk, and Compliance Committee of the Board of Regents. A copy of each written delegation shall be maintained on file as a matter of public record in the Office of the Corporation Secretary.

- 6. Emergency Approval by Board Chair
 - a. Except in cases of Emergency, any purported Contract of a type not described in RP 6.3.1.4 will have no force or effect and shall not be binding upon the University until such Contract shall have received approval by the Board of Regents.
 - b. In cases of Emergency, a proposed Contract of a type not described in RP-6.3.1.4 may be approved by the Chair of the Board of Regents after consultation with at least a majority of the members of the Executive Committee of the Board of Regents. A written report describing both the nature of the Emergency and the Contract approved shall be made to the Board of Regents at its next regular meeting.

7. Noncompliant Contract Provisions

Without discussion of associated legal risks with the Office of the General Counsel, an Authorized Signatory shall not enter a Contract containing any provision that purports to:

- a. Obligate the University to indemnify any third party;
- Consent to venue outside the state of Nebraska or the jurisdiction of courts other than courts in the state of Nebraska;

- c. Consent to a formal method of resolution of disputes arising under the Contract not instituted in accordance with Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 81-8,302 to -8,306; or
- d. Require the application of the law of any state other than the state of Nebraska.
- 8. Limitations of Contractor Liability.
 - a. As a public entity and educational institution representing Nebraska taxpayers and University students, the University considers requests to limit a Contractor's liability to be matters of public policy. It is not normally appropriate for taxpayers and students to bear the risk of a Contractor's breach of a Contract. If the University agrees to limit a Contractor's liability:
 - 1) The limit should be tied to the cost of the Contractor's potential liability under the Contract; and
 - The limit shall not apply to the Contractor's liability for death, personal injury, or damage to Real Property or arising from the Contractor's gross negligence or willful misconduct.
 - b. In making determinations under this RP-6.3.1.8, the Authorized Signatory shall consider whether:
 - Insurance coverage amounts and types required under the Contract are sufficient to cover the cost of reasonably foreseeable risks that may arise under the Contract; and
 - 2) The amount of any limitation of Contractor liability exceeds the cost of any reasonably foreseeable risks that may arise under the Contract.

9. Effects of Noncompliance

A Contract signed by an individual without documented signature authority or that contains any provision contrary to RP-6.3.1.3, .7, or .8 is not binding on the University and may subject the individual who signed the Contract to University disciplinary action.

RP-6.3.2 Qualification-Based Selection of Professional Services of Architects, Engineers, Landscape Architects, and Registered Land Surveyors

1. Purpose

This RP-6.3.2 is intended to provide substantive standards to guide University-wide implementation. The CEO/President and Senior Vice President for Business and Finance and CFO shall have the authority to administer and implement the same.

2. Policy Reference and Definitions

The Nebraska Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act, Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 81-1701 to -1721, governs the procurement of professional architectural, engineering, landscape architecture, and land surveying services by the state of Nebraska and all agencies thereof, including the University. In the event of a conflict between the provisions of the Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act and this RP-6.3.2, the provisions of the Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act shall control.

In addition, those definitions set forth in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 81-1704 to -1710 shall apply to this RP-6.3.2.

3. Procurement of Licensed Professional Services; Exception for Four-Year Selection Process

Except for the four-year selection process provided in RP-6.3.2.4, when Licensed Professional Services are required for a project where the estimated Construction Cost of the project or the estimated fees for such Licensed Professional Services exceed ten times the statutory minimum fee provided by Neb. Rev. Stat. § 81-1712(1), the Contractor to provide the Licensed Professional Services will be selected in accordance with the procedures set forth in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 81-1712 to -1715 and https://www.utilizingin.accordance-with-the-Project Evaluation Board-University's standard selection procedure-as described in RP-6.3.87.

4. Four-Year Selection Process

When Licensed Professional Services are required and the estimated Construction Cost or the estimated fee for such Licensed Professional Services is between the statutory minimum fee provided by Neb. Rev. Stat. § 81-1712(1) and ten times the statutory minimum fee, the Contractor to provide the Licensed Professional Services may be selected from the University's four-year list of Licensed Professional Service Contractors determined in accordance with the procedures set forth in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 81-1712 to -1715 and the University's established four-year selection procedures. The four-year list shall be approved by the Board of Regents.

5. Purchase of Licensed Professional Services Costing Less than the Statutory Minimums

When Licensed Professional Services for a project where the estimated Construction Cost or the estimated fee for such Licensed Professional Services are less than the statutory minimums provided by Neb. Rev. Stat. § 81-1712(1), the Principal Business Officer shall select the Licensed Professional Services Contractor.

6. Preference for Nebraska Firms

In view of the size, number, and experience of firms in the state of Nebraska, and the more effective delivery of Licensed Professional Services usually realized from Contractors having close proximity to the University, there is a preference for in-state registered firms or joint ventures over out-of-state registered firms unless:

- a. The project requires special knowledge or professional experience which is not otherwise available within the state of Nebraska;
- b. The selection of an out-of-state Licensed Professional Services Contractor is considered necessary to obtain a major gift, grant, or other funding for a project; or

c. The out-of-state firm has established experience that is beneficial to and in the best interests of the University.

7. Licensed Professional Services Firm Data

The Associate Vice President for University Services will maintain files and update, at least annually, University data on Licensed Professional Services firms. These files will be the primary source of information for certifying Licensed Professional Services firms pursuant to this RP-6.3.2.

RP-6.3.3 Ownership of Artwork

1. Copyright

- a. Whenever possible, the University will attempt to obtain a complete assignment of the copyright(s) for a work of art at the time it purchases the work of art. It will also attempt to obtain full warranty of genuineness, authorship, title, and authority to transfer both the work of art and the copyrights.
- b. If the owner of the work of art and of the copyrights cannot or will not assign the copyrights, then the University will attempt to obtain the licenses that it needs on a royalty-free basis. Generally, these are copyright licenses to reproduce the work, display the work, prepare derivatives of the work, and distribute copies of the work. The University will, at the same time, attempt to obtain the right to authorize others to hold the same rights without the payment of a royalty.
- c. The University may split royalties with artists in the case that the works are reproduced for advertising by for-profit entities or copies are made for commercial sale.

2. Museum Collections

- a. The Board of Regents shall hold title to the permanent collections of University museums and galleries.
- b. The Board of Regents authorizes the Principal Business Officer or their designee to approve additions or deletions to any collection provided that such actions are in accordance with the museum's accessioning and deaccessioning policies.
- c. Each museum or gallery shall develop and maintain policies for accessioning and deaccessioning permanent collections. These policies and any amendments require approval by the Principal Business Officer.

RP-6.3.4 Building Renewal Fund

1. Purpose and Policy Reference

RP-6.3.4 is intended to provide substantive standards to guide the establishment and management of the Building Renewal Fund. The CEO/President and Senior Vice President for Business and Finance and CFO shall have the authority to manage the Fund within the framework of this policy.

The Building Renewal Fund supports the long-term stewardship of the University's facilities, allows the University to prepare long-term capital renewal plans and manage these financial resources holistically across the University, and fulfills the requirements of Neb. Rev. Stat. § 85-421.

2. Program Overview

The Building Renewal Fund is established within the Office of the Senior Vice President for Business and Finance and CFO. The Building Renewal Fund will provide funding for approved capital renewal projects across the University. The Building Renewal Fund will be managed in a manner consistent with RP-6.3.6.

3. Building Renewal Fund Management

- a. The Building Renewal Fund will be administered by the Office of the Senior Vice President for Business and Finance and CFO.
- b. The Building Renewal Fund was established with an initial \$2,000,000 deposit as part of the University's FY2023-24 operating budget approved by the Board of Regents on June 22, 2023 (BRUN, Minutes, 76, p. 214). The Board of Regents directs the CEO/President and the Senior Vice President for Business and Finance and CFO to increase the annual allocation to the Building Renewal Fund by at least \$2,000,000 per year until the Building Renewal Fund has a minimum annual budget of \$64,000,000. Any changes to this funding plan must be approved by the Board of Regents.
- c. The Senior Vice President for Business and Finance and CFO will develop five-year capital renewal plans based on the Building Renewal Fund's forecasted value. These plans will be reviewed by the Business and Finance Committee of the Board of Regents and reported to the Board of Regents.
- d. The Building Renewal Fund may only be used for capital renewal, renovation, replacement, or repair projects. All projects must be completed in accordance with the Bylaws and Board of Regents policies. The Building Renewal Fund is intended for 'state-aided' supported facilities and is not available to auxiliary funded renewal projects without approval of the CEO/President and the Senior Vice President for Business and Finance and CFO.
- e. The Senior Vice President for Business and Finance and CFO shall prepare and submit a report to the Nebraska Legislature biennially which details: (1) the projects expected to be constructed or newly financed in the next biennium from the University of Nebraska Facilities Program; and (2) the projects that were constructed or newly financed in the previous biennium from the University of Nebraska Facilities Program. Additionally, every five years, the University will provide the Nebraska Legislature with a copy of its long-term capital plan for projects to be constructed or newly financed from the University of Nebraska Facilities Program.

RP-6.3.5 Injury and Illness Prevention Program

1. Policy References

- a. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 48-433 to -446, relating to building and workplace safety.
- b. 230 Neb. Admin. Code § 6, relating to workplace safety.

2. Purpose

The purpose of this RP-6.3.5 is to establish procedures for the development and implementation of an effective written injury and illness prevention program for the University which promotes occupational safety and health practices and strives to reduce work-related accidents and injuries throughout the University.

3. Safety Policy

- a. The University recognizes its role of stewardship in protecting and conserving the resources of the University. Each employee of the University must also recognize this commitment and practice the highest degree of concern for the safety of the University community. It is the policy of the University to promote safety at all times and to prevent occupational injury, illness, and financial loss within the University community.
- b. The personal safety and health of each employee of the University is of primary importance. Prevention of occupationally induced injuries and illnesses is of such importance that priority will be given to supporting and funding programs and projects that prevent occupational injury and illness. To the greatest degree possible, the University will provide all equipment and instruction on safety practices required for personal safety and health.
- c. The responsibility for implementation of the safety program on each Campus is assigned to the CAO/Chancellor or the CAO/Chancellor's designee. This includes the development and maintenance of an effective written injury and illness prevention plan as required by Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 48-443 to -446 and Nebraska Administrative Code Title 230, Chapter 6 and the establishment of a Campus safety committee.

4. University Injury and Illness Prevention Program

An effective written injury and illness prevention program shall be published by each Campus and contain, at a minimum, the following provisions unless otherwise dictated by a Campus collective bargaining agreement:

- a. A written safety policy outlining the CAO/Chancellors' policy for providing a safe and healthy work environment for all employees.
- b. One person shall be assigned to act as the Campus safety officer. This person, in coordination with the safety committee, will be responsible for the development and administration of the injury and illness prevention program.
- c. A Campus safety committee will be established to assist the Campus by making recommendations on methods to reduce hazards impacting safety and health on the Campus. The Campus safety committee will be composed of equal representatives from the faculty, staff, and administration of the Campus. All employees shall be eligible to serve as members of the committee. The committee shall meet at least quarterly and

- maintain written minutes of its meetings for at least three years. All recordable workplace injuries and/or illnesses may be reviewed by the Campus safety committee.
- d. A comprehensive safety training program shall be established and maintained by the Campus which provides initial safety orientation on rules, policies, and job-specific procedures for new employees; job-specific training for employees before they perform hazardous work; and refresher training, or dissemination of information, on at least an annual basis regarding the injury and illness prevention plan, safety rules, policies, and procedures.
- e. A formal publication of rules, policies, and procedures shall be developed and communicated in a manner easily understood by all employees, including non-English speaking individuals.
- f. Each Campus will establish written procedures to ensure that all work-related accidents are reported and investigated by the immediate supervisor, department manager having jurisdiction over the affected area, and/or the Campus safety officer. Written summaries explaining the details of the accident will be prepared by investigating officials. Accident and investigation reports may be reviewed by the Campus safety committee. Procedures for reporting workplace deaths must also be included in the plan.
- g. Contingency plans shall be developed to ensure that imminent hazards are identified, controlled, and, if possible, eliminated from the worksite.
- h. A documentation program shall be developed that will assure the preservation of accident reports, summaries of investigations, training, accident injury and illness records, and inspection reports. Such records will be retained consistent with applicable regulatory requirements.
- i. A method of identifying and correcting worksite hazards shall be established by the Campus safety officer. Such inspections and surveys may be conducted in cooperation with the Campus safety committee at least annually. The Campus safety committee may review worksite safety inspection reports and make recommendations on accident prevention.
- j. The person or persons in charge of campus safety and health programs shall be granted, in writing, the authority to take immediate corrective action whenever a hazardous condition exists which could result in personal injury or death to any individual and/or substantial damage to University property.
- k. An employee may not be discharged or discriminated against because he or she makes any oral or written complaint to the Campus safety committee or safety coordinator, or to any governmental agency having regulatory responsibility for occupational health and safety. See Neb. Rev. Stat. § 48-443(4).

RP-6.3.6 Capital Planning and Development

1. Purpose

The purpose of the this RP-6.3.6 is to ensure there is a process for developing efficient and quality facilities necessary for the University to continue to provide the citizens of Nebraska with educational and economic opportunities that can allow them to realize a high quality of life.

This RP-6.3.6 is intended to provide substantive standards to guide University-wide implementation. The CEO/President and Senior Vice President for Business and Finance and CFO shall have the authority to administer and implement the same.

Phases

The capital planning and development process is divided into the following phases:

- a. The capital planning and development process is divided into the following phases: The Master Planning Phase focuses on the relationship between the Campus -mission statement, strategic plan and the facility development plan relative to the Nebraska Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education's Comprehensive Statewide Plan for Postsecondary Education. Review starts with the University strategic planning framework and its overarching goals which guide University-wide and Campus planning and proceeds through each Campus facility development plan. These plans are reviewed every five years.
- b. The Capital Improvement Phase focuses on the existing condition, utilization, and expenditure of capital resources at each Campus. This phase includes the University's six year capital plan and may include a report on the University's land and leasing activities, building renewal needs, and deferred maintenance activities. The result is an identification of the capital projects for the coming fiscal year and the future capital projects that may begin during the succeeding two years. Donor projects of opportunity that arise are incorporated into the process as needed. These activities occur annually or as needed.
- The Feasibility Phase pertains to all capital projects where the highest value in the C. estimated Total Project Cost range exceeds or is equal to \$7,500,000. The Feasibility Phase focuses on the development of an initial project concept and estimated Total Project Cost range and how a proposed project aligns with existing Master Planning Phase and Capital Improvement Phase plans. During the Feasibility Phase, an initial project concept and estimated Total Project Cost range is prepared and submitted to the Business and Finance Committee of the Board of Regents in a feasibility charter for review. The feasibility charter for each project shall include at least the following components: the initial project concept and scope, the estimated Total Project Cost range, anticipated funding sources (including whether public or private funds or a combination is expected to be utilized), and whether the project is expected to be delivered in Stages. Upon review of the feasibility charter for a project, the Business and Finance Committee will provide a recommendation to the Principal Business Officer regarding the feasibility of the project and its alignment with overarching University goals and planning. Approval of the feasibility charter constitutes authorization by the Board of Regents for the project to proceed to the Program Statement Phase. Information provided during the Feasibility Phase, including but not limited to the initial project concept, estimated Total Project Cost range, anticipated funding sources, and whether the project is expected to be delivered in Stages, is information that will only be used for purposes of determining reviewing project feasibility and, if a project proceeds past the Feasibility Phase, this information will be further developed as the project progresses.
- d. The Program Statement Phase pertains to all capital projects with an estimated Total Project Cost of \$7,500,000 or more, except Renewal Projects and Infrastructure Projects. Projects below the \$7,500,000 Total Project Cost threshold encountering unforeseen conditions that result in the Total Project Cost exceeding such threshold must be approved by the Board of Regents.

The Program Statement Phase begins with the University developing an architectural program and ends with the Board of Regents granting preliminary project approval by approving the program statement.

Projects in the Program Statement Phase are divided into the following categories:

1) Traditional Projects

To aid in the development of the architectural program for a Traditional Project, the University may expend up to the greater of \$100,000 or 1% of the estimated Total Project Cost for professional consultant services. The completed architectural program shall be summarized into the program statement. The program statement shall then be submitted through the Business and Finance Committee to the Board of Regents for review. Board of Regents approval of the program statement represents preliminary project approval. Preliminary project approval for a Traditional Project constitutes:

- i. Approval of the project concept, preliminary scope, and preliminary Total Project Cost;
- ii. Approval of the project delivery method;
- iii. Authority to hire consultant Contractors to initiate design, cost estimating, and/or alternative project delivery through the Approval Phase;
- iv. Authority to spend up to 10% of the preliminary Total Project Cost to complete design through the Approval Phase;
- v. Authority to spend up to 10% of the preliminary Total Project Cost for construction manager preconstruction services, early procurement, and site preparation activities; and
- vi. When required, authority to forward the architectural program to the Nebraska Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education.

2) Mega Projects

The CEO/President may authorize initial Mega Project planning after consulting with a majority of the Executive Committee of the Board of Regents.

Authorization by the CEO/President of Mega Project initial planning constitutes:

- i. Approval of the project delivery method;
- ii. Authority to select and hire the construction Contractor for the project;
- iii. Authority to hire consultant Contractors to initiate design, cost estimating, and fundraising feasibility studies; and
- iv. Authority to spend up to a total of 10% of the preliminary Total Project Cost, but not to exceed \$10,000,000, prior to program statement approval.

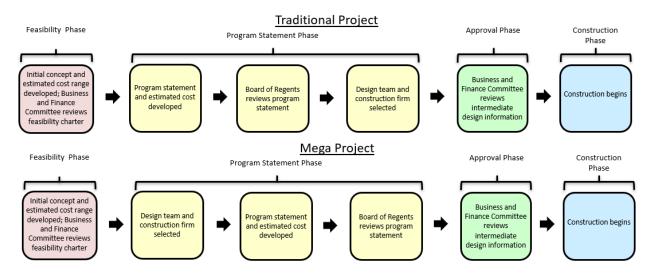
After approval authorization of Mega Project initial planning, the architectural program shall be summarized into a program statement. The program statement shall then be submitted through the Business and Finance Committee to the Board of Regents for review. Board of Regents approval of the program

statement represents preliminary project approval. Preliminary project approval for a Mega Project constitutes:

- A. Approval of the project concept, preliminary scope, and preliminary Total Project Cost; and
- B. When required, authority to forward the architectural program to the Nebraska Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education.

All amounts authorized to be spent in this RP-6.3.6.2.d shall be considered an absolute maximum unless and until the Board of Regents authorizes expenditure of a different amount, in which case the amount authorized to be expended by the Board of Regents shall control and supersede any authorization in this RP-6.3.6.2.d.

An example of the phase sequencing for Traditional Projects and Mega Projects is shown below. This example is for illustrative purposes only and shall not be used to limit or alter the provisions of this RP 6.3.6:



- e. The Approval Phase applies to (1) all projects required to complete the Program Statement Phase and (2) Infrastructure Projects and Renewal Projects. For a project to be completed in Stages, each Stage must be separately approved in the Approval Phase. For a project that is not to be completed in Stages, the entire project will proceed through the Approval Phase at one time. The Approval Phase begins with review of the intermediate design information and ends with approval of the project or Stage under review. The completed intermediate design information will be summarized and submitted to the Business and Finance Committee of the Board of Regents for review.
 - 1) Program Statement Phase Projects. For a project required to complete the Program Statement Phase, the Approval Phase focuses on differences in the project or Stage under review when compared to the preliminary project approval, specifically differences in the scope, schedule, and respective Total Project Cost or Total Stage Cost and the rationale for such differences. If the Business and Finance Committee determines a Material Change has not occurred, the project or Stage under review is approved and such approval shall be reported to the Board of Regents at the next regular meeting. If the Business and Finance Committee determines a Material Change has occurred, the project or Stage under review will be resubmitted to the Board of Regents and approval is achieved upon Board of Regents approval of all Material Changes.

2) Renewal Projects or Infrastructure Projects. For a Renewal Project or Infrastructure Project, the Approval Phase focuses on review of intermediate design information and the scope, schedule, and Total Project Cost or Total Stage Cost.

Approval in the Approval Phase sets the scope and respective Total Project Cost or Total Stage Cost for the approved project or Stage and constitutes:

- A) Authority to proceed with financing for the approved project or Stage;
- B) For a Traditional Project including an Infrastructure Project or Renewal Project, authority to contract with Contractors to complete the design, prepare construction documents, and construct the approved project or Stage within, as applicable, the approved Total Project Cost or Total Stage Cost;
- C) For a Mega Project including an Infrastructure Project or Renewal Project, authority to proceed with necessary consulting or other services to complete the design, complete the construction documents, and construct the approved project or Stage within, as applicable, the approved Total Project Cost or Total Stage Cost;
- D) Delegation to the CEO/President to approve and execute all Contracts, including any amendments and change orders to such Contracts, related to the approved project or Stage and within, as applicable, the approved Total Project Cost or Total Stage Cost; and
- E) Authority to report Material Changes approved by the Board of Regents to the Nebraska Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education.
- f. In the Construction Phase, the project and/or Stage work approved via the Approval Phase is completed. The Board of Regents monitors status through routine quarterly status reports and special reports, as requested by the Board of Regents. Such reports must include determination as to whether the project or Stage is on time and on budget and appropriate metrics, which must include without limitation project or Stage status, schedule, milestones, and budget. Increases to the approved Total Project Cost or Total Stage Cost must be approved by the Board of Regents.
- g. In the Closeout Phase, the project reaches substantial completion and the University causes all non-conforming or incomplete items to be corrected, completes building commissioning, completes final inspection, accepts and occupies the facility, provides final payment to Contractors, and completes an evaluation of each Contractor's performance. During the Closeout Phase, the Board of Regents shall receive a status report approximately one year after substantial completion of the project has been achieved.
- 3. The approved Total Project Cost or Total Stage Cost shall be considered an absolute maximum and the benchmark for budget, scope, or program statement changes. Significant Changes within a project, either in the scope or nature of the construction to be completed or the programs to be served by the project, shall not be allowed without the written approval of the CEO/President. Any Significant Change approved by the CEO/President shall be reported to the Board of Regents at its next regular meeting.

RP-6.3.7 Qualification-Based Selection

1. Purpose

The purpose of this RP-6.3.7 is to encourage construction excellence and budget and schedule control by providing an impartial, objective, and competitive system open to all qualified firms. When Program Management Services are required or construction management or design-build services are approved by the Board of Regents under RP-6.3.6, the Contractor to provide such services will be selected in accordance with the below University standard selection procedures.

- 2. Procurement of Construction Manager at Risk Services and Design-Build Services
 - a. When construction manager at risk services or design-build services are approved by the Board of Regents under RP-6.3.6, the Contractor to provide such services will be selected <u>under RP-6.2.1</u> with the <u>qualifications of the Contractor being the primary</u> <u>consideration for selection and utilizing the Project Evaluation Board as described in RP-6.3.8.</u>
 - b. After signing a Contract, the Campus will report the name of the successful construction Contractor at the next regularly scheduled Board of Regents meeting.
- 3. Procurement of Program Management Services
 - a. Program Management Services can be obtained in one of two ways:
 - 1) When Program Management Services are approved by the Board of Regents under RP-6.3.6, the Contractor to provide such Program Management Services will be selected <u>under RP-6.2.1 with the qualifications of the Contractor being the primary consideration for selection and utilizing the Project Evaluation Board as described in RP-6.3.8; or</u>
 - Program Management Services can also be selected from the University's list of qualified firms when such list is determined in accordance with the University four-year selection procedure.
 - b. After signing a Contract, the Campus will report the name of the successful Contractor at the next regularly scheduled Board of Regents meeting.

RP-6.3.8 Project Evaluation Board

1. Purpose

This RP-6.3.8 is intended to provide substantive standards to guide University-wide implementation. The CEO/President and Senior Vice President for Business and Finance and CFO shall have the authority to administer and implement the same.

Formation

- a. Each project requiring qualification-based selection in accordance with the requirements of RP-6.3.2 and RP-6.3.7 shall use a Project Evaluation Board assembled from University representatives, and members from the Project Evaluation Board pool described in this RP-6.3.8.
- b. The Project Evaluation Board pool will consist of members who are not employed by the University and who are active or past owners in their respective businesses. Members of the pool will generally be architects, engineers, landscape architects, or other professionals familiar with the building type or construction method approved by the Board of Regents. Members of the Project Evaluation pool will be approved by the Senior Vice President for Business and Finance and CFO.
- c. The Project Evaluation Board shall consist of an equal number of University representatives and Project Evaluation Board pool members, and the Chair of the Project Evaluation Board. The Associate Vice President for University Services, designated the Chair, shall be the impartial referee of each Project Evaluation Board, conduct the proceedings of each Project Evaluation Board for the benefit of all concerned, and vote on each Project Evaluation Board only as a tiebreaker. Additionally, the Chair will provide each Project Evaluation Board an analysis of the fee and Contract general conditions or price proposal, when appropriate, so that construction manager at risk and design-build evaluations will be as consistent as possible. Each Project Evaluation Board will consider each firm's capabilities to perform, adequacy of personnel, past record of performance, and experience and expertise to render the Services required.
- d. It is intended that the member composition of each Project Evaluation Board will fluctuate from project to project, providing flexibility to match appropriate expertise with a specific project; to avoid conflicts of interest; or to accommodate scheduling or other conflicts. The Chair, with input from the Campus, shall determine the membership to serve for each Project Evaluation Board. At least one member of the Project Evaluation Board must have direct, relevant employment experience in the area of expertise being evaluated.

Conflicts

- a. No member of a Project Evaluation Board shall engage in any activity that in any way conflicts with his or her duties and responsibilities as a member of the Project Evaluation Board or that otherwise constitutes a conflict of interest under applicable law or University policy.
- b. A conflict of interest shall exist when a potential Project Evaluation Board member is a principal or an employee of any team or firm being evaluated or has a similar financial or other relationship with the team, firm, or its consultants.

4. Funding and Compensation

- a. All costs of a Project Evaluation Board will be funded from the project for which the selection applies, or from related sources designated by the appropriate Campus.
- b. The University shall compensate each Project Evaluation Board pool member selected to serve on a Project Evaluation Board for services provided as an independent consultant

at a fixed rate per hour. University members of a Project Evaluation Board will typically not receive compensation from project funds in addition to their normal earnings from the University. Any exceptions will be made at the discretion of the Chair.

5. Liability and Insurance

- a. The consulting services provided by the Project Evaluation Board pool members shall not constitute or be construed to constitute routine or standard services normally provided by an architect, engineer, or other contractor for a project. The performance of such consulting services shall not render the members of the Project Evaluation Board pool liable in any way for the Contractor selected by the Project Evaluation Board.
- b. Members of the Project Evaluation Board pool will be covered by appropriate general and professional liability insurance or have equivalent risk loss coverage under the University's self-insurance program to the same extent as other University personnel when performing duties as members of a Project Evaluation Board on behalf of the University.

RP-6.3.9 Approval of Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory Fees

The fee schedule for the veterinary diagnostic laboratories, Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, will be subject to annual review and necessary approval by the Vice Chancellor for the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

RP-6.3.10 University Business Activities

- 1. University mission-related business activities do not require specific approval by the Board of Regents, unless otherwise required by the Bylaws or Board of Regents policies. Mission-related business activities are business activities that meet at least one of the following three criteria:
 - a. The activity is deemed to be an integral part of the University's fulfillment of its educational, research, or public service missions or campus support functions.
 - b. The activity is needed to provide, at a reasonable price or on reasonable terms, an Article or Service that is essential to the Campus community.
 - c. The activity is for the primary benefit of the Campus community but with consideration of the Articles and Services available in the outside community.
- 2. Unrelated business activities (as defined by Internal Revenue Service code) that do not meet one of the three criteria above must be approved by the Board of Regents.

PRESENTERS:

In order to provide continuity of leadership within the Board of Regents, the proposed amendments to Section 1.3 of the Bylaws of the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska and Section 1.2 of the Standing Rules of the Board of Regents would extend the term of the Chairperson two years. The proposed amendment to the Standing Rules would also remove the automatic succession of the Vice Chairperson to the office of Chairperson and the end of such term.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for information only and will be brought back to the Board for consideration at its next meeting.

Bylaws of the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska

- 1.3 **The Officers**. The Chair and Vice Chair shall be installed at the annual meeting in odd numbered years in accordance with the processes set forth in the *Standing Rules of the Board of Regents*.
 - 1.3.1 **The Chair of the Board.** Unless he or she resigns or is removed by a majority vote of the Board, the Chair shall hold office for one-two years or until a successor is selected and qualified. The Chair shall preside at all meetings of the Board at which he or she is present. The Chair's signature shall appear on diplomas and like documents issued by the authority of the Board. Unless it is otherwise ordered by the Board, or otherwise provided in these *Bylaws*, the Chair shall sign all contracts and other instruments requiring execution on the part of the Board and perform all other duties incident to such office. The Chair, in consultation with the Board, shall appoint all Committees of the Board.
 - 1.3.2 Vice Chair of the Board. The Board shall select one of its members as its Vice Chair via an election at the annual meeting each year, whose time of selection and tenure of office shall coincide with that of the Chair. In case of the absence or incapacity of the Chair of the Board, the Vice Chair shall perform the duties of the Chair.

officers. The officers of the Board shall be the Chairperson and the Vice Chairperson.

whom the The Board shall, at its annual meeting in odd numbered years, select from among its voting members a Chairperson, and at the annual meeting each year select a Vice Chairperson. A Vice Chairperson shall be elected at the annual meeting for a term of one year, and thereafter, succeed to the office of Chairperson for a term of one year. A nominee eligible for Vice Chairperson must have sufficient remaining term as Regent, such that he or she may fulfill the duties of Chairperson the following year. If there is more than one nominee for an office, than the elections shall be by secret ballot and the total number of votes for each nominee shall be announced and entered into the minutes. The duties of the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson shall be those set forth in Section 1.3 of the Bylaws and Section 4.3 of these Rules. In the event that the Chairperson and the Vice Chairperson are both absent or otherwise unable to discharge their duties, the board shall, by a majority vote of its members present and qualified to vote, select a presiding officer pro tempore.

Review Summary Center for Children, Family and the Law Internal Review: June 12, 2025

An internal review of the Center for Children, Family, and the Law (CCFL) was conducted on June 12, 2025, by a review team drawn from the College of Arts and Sciences Deans group.* The reviewers were informed by the 2025 CCFL Internal Review Report, a copy of the previous (2017) Center review, and a meeting with the Center's Director, Dr. Eve Brank.

Center Mission: CCFL, established in 1987 as a home for research and public service on child and family policy issues, provides knowledge and guidance to policymakers, scholars, service providers, and the public. The Center summarizes its mission as "Helping the Helpers" by providing an interdisciplinary and collaborative approach to improve systems and outcomes for children and families.

Assessment: CCFL has demonstrated educational reach beyond the university, facilitated university-community partnerships, and provided pathway for involvement of UNL students and UNL faculty members in service learning and civic engagement. The Center has been very successful in obtaining external funding and until recently maintained 80 to 100 personnel supported on grants from federal, state, and local agencies and foundation sources. The number of externally supported personnel has reduced to approximately 70 following a recent and unexpected withdrawal of the State of Nebraska from a successful long-term (> 35 years) partnership with the Center. Although the change came as a surprise, the Director noted that, on balance, the Center is nevertheless in good shape because its portfolio today is more diverse than it was years ago, when it disproportionately relied on its partnership with the State. The reduction in size has resulted in unused leased space, and the Center is reaching out to the university and the community to identify potential users. Echoing a conclusion in the 2017 report, we find that CCFL continues to typify university-community partnership at its best.

Recommendations: CCFL provides a key bridge between university capabilities and community needs and should be renewed as a center. The long-time Director, Eve Brank, will be sharing leadership duties with Associate Director Christine Henningsen during 2025-2026 as CCFL prepares to recruit a new Director through a national search. Due to recent changes in state and federal funding priorities, we recommend that CCFL conduct a strategic review of planned activities and budget priorities in preparation for this recruitment.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Progress towards addressing these recommendations will be the responsibility of the Director and the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. The Center Director undergoes an annual review by the Dean each spring.

Review Summary Nebraska Center for Biotechnology

External Review: April 28-30, 2025 (Report Date: April 30, 2025)

An external scientific review of the Nebraska Center for Biotechnology (NCB) was conducted on April 28-30, 2025. The review team membership* was composed of external administrative and faculty peers with scientific and administrative expertise pertinent to the Center's mission, along with an internal UNL faculty member/administrator who provided institutional context.

Center Mission: NCB's mission is to drive research excellence by providing state-of-the-art technologies through six integrated core facilities that advance research in the areas of biomedical and agricultural sciences. The Center supports faculty research by offering cutting-edge instrumentation, expert technical and scientific support, assistance with grant development and manuscript preparation. Additionally, NCB enhances the university's research environment through workshops, short courses, student fellowships, and scholarship programs. The Center is committed to meeting the evolving needs of the UNL research community and its external collaborators.

Assessment: NCB is a strong, well-organized, and synergistic center, distinguished by the exceptional expertise of its leaders and scientists, who are integral to its operations and scientific contributions. Faculty users respect and attribute significant value to the Center. Some ideas for ensuring the long-term sustainability and ongoing success of NCB include continued strategic investment in ensuring state-of-the-art instrumentation, enhanced collaboration across complementary facilities, and increased financial transparency and support across Center staff who help make daily financial decisions.

Recommendations: The Nebraska Center for Biotechnology (NCB) remains a highly valued and strategically important asset within the Nebraska research community and should be retained and strengthened. The Center operates effectively and maintains strong momentum, and there are opportunities to further enhance long-term sustainability and impact. Key recommendations to support their growth include expanding administrative capacity to drive operational excellence, implementing standardized management tools and practices to optimize efficiency, developing a comprehensive financial strategy that incorporates long-term planning and potential endowment opportunities. Enhancing internal communications and recognizing core personnel as integral research partners will further strengthen the Center's collaborative culture. Investing in professional development and establishing a defined career track for core facility personnel will help retain the Center's expertise. Additionally, prioritizing leadership succession planning, increasing private-sector engagement, and cultivating broader strategic partnerships will be critical to advancing NCB's visibility, competitiveness, and long-term impact.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Progress towards addressing these recommendations will be the responsibility of the Center for Biotechnology Director, with oversight from the UNL Office of Research and Innovation and the collaborating units: Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, College of Arts and Sciences, and College of Engineering.

Internal Review: June 11, 2025 (Report Date: June 11, 2025)

An internal review of the Nebraska Center for Mass Spectrometry (NCMS) was conducted on June 10, 2025 by three members of the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) Deans Office.* The review was informed by the 2017 review of NCMS, an analysis of the recent NCMS budgets, the 2025 Chemistry APR, and a meeting between the review team and the Chair of Chemistry.

Center Mission: The Nebraska Center for Mass Spectrometry provides access to a range of techniques for analysis of the composition and structure of molecules and biomolecules.

Assessment: The 2017 review found NCMS to be delivering important services but expressed concerns about aging equipment and a limited number of external users. The 2025 Chemistry APR self-study and the conversation with the Chair make clear that NCMS is well-equipped with instrumentation mainly purchased since the previous review; this includes an extremely high resolution Bruker 15T FT-ICR. These instruments serve needs in proteomics, lipidomics, and metabolomics, and are used significantly by the NIH COBRE Center for Integrated Biomolecular Communication. However, the capabilities of the center are underutilized by the campus. Administratively, NCMS has been wrapped within a Molecular Analysis and Characterization facility which has simplified administration and billing. The part-time availability of an on-site service engineer with experience in mass spec enables the facility to avoid expensive service contracts; NCMS also works with a part-time electronics person in the Department of Physics. The revenue stream is reasonable and carry-forward budget deficits are within allowed range.

Recommendations: Center status should be retained. NCMS continues to play a key role in supporting fundamental research and providing support to university researchers in proteomics, metabolomics, and small molecular identification and analysis. Long-term leadership should be addressed. The Chair of Chemistry has served as Interim Director since 2021. Chemistry and CAS have proposed that Dr. Jared Shaw, an unusually experienced pre-tenure faculty member, be appointed as Director of NCMS; this proposal is awaiting approval. It will be important for leadership to identify new users; the COBRE center mentioned above will be submitting a phase 3 (final 5-year term) soon. Other important matters include the possibility of a faculty hire in mass spectrometry and the interaction of NCMS with researchers and facilities across the campus.

Responsibility for Monitoring: While the Chair of Chemistry remains the Interim Director of NCMS, progress towards addressing these recommendations will be the responsibility of the Chair and the Dean of the College and evaluated as part of the Chair's annual review.

Review Summary Nebraska Center for Virology

External Review: May 19-21, 2025 (Report Date: June 20, 2025)

An external scientific review of the Nebraska Center for Virology (NCV) was conducted on May 19-21, 2025. The review team membership* was composed of external administrative and faculty peers with scientific and administrative expertise pertinent to the Center's mission, along with an internal UNL faculty member/administrator who provided institutional context.

Center Mission: The NCV's mission is to foster a multidisciplinary, collaborative environment that advances innovative research and training in virology, with a focus on human, animal, and plant viruses. By integrating basic and clinical science, the center is committed to advancing the understanding of virus-host interactions to inform the prevention and treatment of viral diseases. NCV is dedicated to scientific excellence, intellectual property generation, and cultivating the next generation of virologists to support public health and economic growth.

Assessment: The NCV has a national and international reputation for excellence in virology research and education built over the early decades of this century and reinforced through its continued annual symposium that attracts world renowned scientists as speakers and participants. The Center is distinguished by its broad focus across plant, animal, and human viruses. NCV is at a critical juncture; comprehensive strategic planning is needed to identify a clear vision for long-term sustainability that considers expanding faculty affiliation with the Center, leveraging strengths across UNL and UNMC, and scaffolding towards programmatic and center grants that ensure long term viability of the Center.

Recommendations: The NCV is a reputable and strategically important asset within the Nebraska research community and should be retained. To reignite NCV's growth, key recommendations include expanding its interdisciplinary network to incorporate diverse scientific disciplines, re-engaging members from UNMC to strengthen institutional collaboration, and cultivating strategic external partnerships. Developing a strategic plan is critical for enhancing engagement, cohesiveness, and collaboration across an expanded network, so that research strengths can be identified and expertise gaps realized and addressed through faculty hires, all to position NCV to pursue large-scale, multi-PI extramural funding opportunities and enhance its overall research competitiveness. NCV would benefit from implementing a structured, multi-faceted mentoring program for early career faculty, graduate students, and post-docs. Lastly, Center space should be strategically leveraged to create a hub for innovation and collaboration by prioritizing faculty labs that foster interdisciplinary networks, support shared technologies, and leverage the cryo-EM facility, in order to optimize NCV's research impact.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Progress towards addressing these recommendations will be the responsibility of the Center for Virology Director, with oversight from the UNL Office of Research and Innovation and the collaborating units: Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, and College of Arts and Sciences.

Review Summary University of Nebraska Public Policy Center External Review (May 17, 2025)

(Report Date: June 13, 2025)

An external review of the University of Nebraska Public Policy Center (PPC) was conducted on April 29, 2025. The review team membership was composed of Joseph Wright (Director of Security, Lincoln Public Schools), Shari Veil (Dean, College of Journalism and Mass Communications, UNL), Hassan Ramzah (Assistant Vice Chancellor & Chief of Police, UNL), Howard Liu (Chair, Department of Psychiatry, UNMC), and chaired by Rick Bevins (Director, Rural Drug Addiction Research Center, UNL).

Center Mission: The PPC functions as a university-wide, multidisciplinary research and outreach unit dedicated to addressing pressing social challenges through informed public policy. Its mission is to link policy with research, process, and practice through collaboration with researchers, policymakers, and stakeholders across Nebraska and beyond.

Assessment:

Strengths

The reviewers noted the following (as quoted from their report):

- The PPC has cultivated a high-performing, interdisciplinary environment that consistently delivers results. Part of this success is attributable to the Center's flexible structure which allows it to respond quickly to emerging needs and policy questions. Its successful track record in securing grants and cultivating long-term client relationships is notable.
- Staff morale is high, reflecting a workplace culture built on mutual respect, growth opportunities, and strong leadership.
- Graduate students and trainees are meaningfully integrated into the Center's work, gaining hands-on
 experience in public policy research and evaluation. Leadership development is a clear organizational
 priority, with internal mentoring and advancement paths fostering long-term commitment and
 institutional knowledge.

Weaknesses

Given the self-funded nature of the PPC, the reviewers noted several challenges that may limit its broader impact. Despite continued efforts, faculty engagement can be uneven given the range of projects. Further, communications and marketing efforts can be improved to highlight the visibility of PPC's successes on campus and in the public eye. The Center relies heavily on multiple grant and contract sources and has not fully leveraged philanthropic or related sources of support. The fast-paced project-oriented environment leaves limited time for strategic planning or scholarly publication.

Recommendations: Center status should be retained

Consistent with questions posed to the reviewers from PPC leadership, recommendations included:

- Strengthen external communication and marketing, leveraging existing content and collaborations.
- Continue to diversify funding streams beyond grants and contracts to include philanthropic options.
- Continue to improve faculty engagement.
- Support staff scholarship.
- Continue staff retention efforts.
- Address eventual leadership succession.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Monitoring annual progress of the PPC in addressing the recommendations will be the responsibility of the PPC Director, Executive Vice Chancellor, and Chief Academic Officer (and/or their designees).



External Review Summary Center for Drug Delivery & Nanomedicine

Progress Review: Summer 2025 (Report Date: July 1, 2025)

An external review of the Center for Drug Delivery & Nanomedicine was conducted in summer 2025. The review team membership* was composed of faculty outside the NU system, and the review for the BoR report was led by the UNMC Vice Chancellor for Research**.

Center Mission: The Center for Drug Delivery and Nanomedicine (CDDN) serves to unify existing diverse technical and scientific expertise in biomedical, materials, and pharmaceutical science research at the University of Nebraska to create a world-class interdisciplinary drug delivery and nanomedicine program. This is realized by integrating established expertise in drug delivery, gene therapy, neuroscience, pathology, immunology, pharmacology, vaccine therapy, cancer biology, polymer science, and nanotechnology at the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC), the University of Nebraska at Lincoln (UNL), and the University of Nebraska Omaha (UNO). CDDN programmatic goals are: translational & clinical research, industrial collaboration & sponsored research, technology transfer, academic excellence, and educational & social contribution.

Assessment: Strengths: The Center has 48 members across 15 basic to clinical departments. During the reporting period, CDDN members supported a healthy mix of individual and large, programmatic NIH grants in the CDDN mission: (2) P30, (1) P01, (1) U01, (1) U54, (31) R01, and (5) R21. The Center has demonstrated academic contribution with 281 publications, seminars, and the Annual Biopharmaceutical Research and Development Symposiums, with the College of Pharmacy, convening academia and industry, attracting 100-150 participants annually. Administration. During the reporting period, CDDN transitioned directorship from Tatiana Bronich, PhD, to David Oupicky, PhD. Under Dr. Oupicky's leadership, the 2025-2029 CDDN strategic plan prioritized: securing large-scale federal grants, integrating Al and bioinformatics into drug delivery research, upgrading the infrastructure of the Pharmaceutical Formulation, Delivery, and Characterization (PFDC) Core, education, internships, seminars, public communication, and partnerships with patient advocacy groups. CDDN has an active advisory board with representation from multiple UNMC Colleges, UNL, and NSRI.

<u>Areas of improvement</u>: As identified in the CDDN strategic plan, large, programmatic funding should be prioritized. The CDDN should, independently or in partnership with other units, strongly consider establishing an industry-focused External Advisory Board.

Recommendations: Center status should be retained.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Progress towards addressing these recommendations will be the responsibility of Dean, College of Pharmacy, and Vice Chancellor for Research.

Review Summary UNMC Center for Global Health and Development

External Review Spring 2025 (Report Date: 01 July 2025)

An external review of the Center for Global Health and Development (CGHAD) was conducted in spring of 2025. The review team membership* was composed of the UNMC Vice Chancellor for Research and external reviewers**.

Center Mission: To advance global public health knowledge and practices by facilitating transnational partnerships among public health scientists, professionals, and advocates. **Vision**: To be an internationally recognized center of expertise and training for public health students, scholars, and faculty in global health and development. The goals of the center include (1) Create bidirectional exchanges to build expertise in research and training within both the College of Public Health and our partner institutions, (2) Establish UNMC's reputation as a world leader in public health education, research, and practice, (3) Create sustainable opportunities for UNMC scholars and students to experience and engage in global health collaborations, (4) Expand our portfolio to include more opportunities for robust global health research programs and opportunities, and (5) Improve the health status of Nebraskans through new programs and research projects addressing global health concerns.

Assessment: Strengths: The Center demonstrates a strong commitment to student engagement in global public health through international research opportunities, applied practice experiences, and involvement in Fulbright programs. Its capacity to reach both on-campus and online learners, and support of a growing cohort of international students, reflects an adaptable and student-centered approach that is well-aligned with current public and global health education needs. Scholarly Activity & Development. Grants and contracts received during the reporting period exceeded \$1.1M from a variety of federal sponsors (USAID, DoS, and NIH) and non-federal sponsors. CGHAD members published 22 peer-reviewed publications and 2 books directly associated with CGHAD research and programs. The Center has conducted multiple international workshops and meetings spanning a variety of topics (e.g., early childhood, legal preparedness, biological risk management, etc.) across many countries and regions to hundreds of participants across international NGOs and governments/agencies. Administration. CGHAD conducted a two-day strategic planning retreat in 2022, which refined the Center's focus to better align with current global health challenges and opportunities. Clear leadership and reporting have been established. An internal advisory board representing each department and student services at COPH also provides ongoing guidance and support to CGHAD. Membership. The Center has grown to 75 members, 24 of whom are faculty in COPH at UNMC. Areas of improvement: CGHAD should consider expanding the mode of teaching platforms (e.g., virtual workshops or symposiums, collaborative online courses, or case-based simulations). CGHAD could strengthen its integration within the broader university system by facilitating more cross-college joint projects. Consider targeted engagement with NGOs, foundations, and private-sector partners, especially in areas such as digital health, humanitarian response, and implementation science. Center leadership should explore development of a global health alumni network and a global advisory board to guide strategic priorities and ensure responsiveness to global health trends.

Recommendation: Center status should be retained.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Monitoring progress towards addressing these recommendations will be the responsibility of the Dean of COPH and the Vice Chancellor for Research.

External Review Summary Center for Intelligent Healthcare

Progress Review: spring 2025 (Report Date: July 1, 2025)

An external review of the Center for Intelligent Healthcare (CIHC) was conducted, and the review team membership* was composed of the UNMC Vice Chancellor for Research and the Center's established Advisory Committee**.

Center Mission: To connect clinicians, informaticists, engineers, data, computer, and artificial intelligence scientists to create solutions that intelligently simplify care for clinicians and patients.

Assessment: Strengths: The scientific focus of the center is highly relevant to Nebraska, as the applications of Al and high computing can provide tremendous insight into clinical research and patient care. For example, CIHC projects in the reporting period included hypertension management, wearables, and development of cardiology extractor tools supporting API-agnostic approaches to interoperability. Extramural Funding. Internal and philanthropic support launched CIHC; now, a pivot to extramurally sponsored research through industry or federal sponsorship will be important in the phase of Center growth. CIHC is poised to develop a diverse, balanced sponsored portfolio as the Center engaged 17 industry sponsors, three national organizations, and three federal agencies in the reporting period. Scholarly Activity & Development. CIHC faculty have had robust participation in collaboration with other major programs and NU initiatives (IDeA-CTR and NRI Collaboration Initiative). CIHC co-hosted a "Biomedical Research & Health Care Informatics Conference" in 2022, including a keynote by the FDA commissioner. CIHC continues to host grand rounds. Administration. CIHC has a team of staff and students reporting to the CIHC manager to support supercomputing functionality. Membership. 57 NU faculty and 11 faculty external to the system. There are also clear partnerships and connections with Nebraska Medicine.

<u>Areas of improvement</u>: A proforma should be developed to assess the sustainability of the supercomputer as a core facility, with an assessment of the positive/negative aspects of on-prem super computing vs. cloud computing from data privacy, data integrity, and user cost. CIHC leadership should strongly consider the development of key areas of emphasis that can differentiate service lines (e.g., image recognition, etc.) of high computing and add value across multiple biomedical domains.

Recommendation: Center status should be retained. CIHC should address the supercomputing proforma, provide additional clarity to inform revenue for a 5-year business plan and clarify the role/responsibilities of UNeTech, Center Director, and advisory committee.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Progress toward addressing these recommendations will be the responsibility of the Center Director, Associate Dean for the Research College of Medicine, and the Office of Vice Chancellor for Research.

Review Summary Center for Neurodegenerative Disorders External Review: Summer 2025 (Report Date: July 1, 2025)

An external review of the Center for Neurodegenerative Disorders (CND) was conducted in summer 2025. The review team membership* was composed of the UNMC Vice Chancellor for Research and external reviewers**.

Center Mission: The mission of the CND is to provide an important vehicle for stimulating and supporting interdepartmental laboratory and translational research in neurodegenerative disorders at UNMC.

Assessment: Strengths: CND addresses critical unmet therapeutic needs. The focus of neurodegenerative disease is highly relevant as many are increasing in prevalence as the US population ages, and particularly Nebraskans (Nebraska has the highest reported per capita incidence of idiopathic Parkinson's disease in the world). CND translational research contributions include the first elimination of the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) type one in a live animal, development of a first-in-class Alzheimer's mouse model, and selection for hosting an international conference for the Society of NeuroImmune Pharmacology. Scholarly Activity & Development. CND has a strong focus on therapeutic development. During the reporting period, CND has developed substantial intellectual property for new approaches (54 new patents), robust academic contributions (495 peer-reviewed publications), strong academic-industry collaborations (9 partnerships during reporting period), and established UNMC-based start-ups (2 new entities). Extramural Funding. CND has been very successful in acquiring \$74.5M between in extramural funding. CND has a diverse funding portfolio including federal, industry, and philanthropic sponsors as well as 22 endowments. Membership. CND has 24 faculty members across multiple Board of Regents Centers, colleges, and departments

Areas of improvement: The Center would benefit from enhanced integration of early-career investigators into leadership roles to ensure succession planning and mentorship continuity. Establishing greater engagement with Nebraska's rural and underserved populations, particularly given the high local incidence of Parkinson's disease, could further amplify community impact. CND should consider partnerships with neurology disorders clinics. CND should consider establishing a brain/tissue bank. CND should consider developing a formal translational accelerator program, with key partners such as CDDN, that bridges lab-to-market with support from university and state innovation resources, ensuring sustained economic and societal impact.

Recommendations: Center status should be retained.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Progress towards addressing these recommendations will be the responsibility of Dean, College of Medicine, and Vice Chancellor for Research.

External Review Summary Interprofessional Experiential Center for Enduring Learning (iEXCEL)

Progress Review: Summer 2025 (Report Date: July 1, 2025)

An external review of the Interprofessional Experiential Center for Enduring Learning (iEXCEL) was conducted in summer 2025. The review team membership* was composed of the UNMC Vice Chancellor for Research and external reviewer**.

Center Mission: To position UNMC as the global leader/game changer in the delivery of the highly integrated and interdisciplinary adaptive experiential learning for the health sciences, across higher education and beyond.

Assessment: Strengths: iEXCEL technologies and learning models are at the leading edge of revolutionizing health care training with the potential for impacting virtual learning and instruction well beyond the borders of medicine. The Center will also support a simulation center in Kearney opening in 2025. Extramural Funding. iEXCEL was awarded over \$170,000 in funding tied to GME. iEXCEL has established robust collaborations with multiple federal agencies, non-profit organizations, multiple biotech/medtech industry partners, and XR technology entities. iEXCEL's unique positioning on technology development and XR adoption makes it an attractive partner. Scholarly Activity & Development. iEXCEL has supported an outstanding over 35,000 learners during the reporting period. The Center had 12 peer-reviewed publications. Administration. iEXCEL has a strong administrative structure with an established advisory board, strategic advisory group, and external consultants. The Center also has dedicated leadership with a focus on statewide relations critical to advancing iEXCEL's mission. The Center recently created iEXCEL 2.0 - a strategic road map for 2025-2030, the program has set focused priorities for the next five years to advance its mission. These priorities include: expanded access to experiential and immersive learning (especially in rural areas), strengthen human performance and effectiveness research, advance immersive reality capabilities, expand scholarly opportunities for certification, scholarship, and internships, and mature the iEXCEL business mission. Membership. The Center has 100+ faculty.

<u>Areas of improvement</u>: Consistent with the Center's five-year roadmap, iEXCEL 2.0, establishing a research-specific internal review committee would support ongoing efforts to enhance research productivity (e.g., scholarly outputs, novel method development, extramural funding, human performance, etc.) and address any obstacles to growth in this strategic area. The Center should consider conducting a peer-assessment to characterize the impact of personal XR on campus environments beyond the academic mission – social well-being and connectedness. The Center should consider exploring partnerships with key industry players in pursuit of establishing Centers of Excellence, etc.

Recommendation: Center status should be retained.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Progress toward addressing these recommendations will be the responsibility of the Center Director, Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, and the Office of Vice Chancellor for Research.

Review Summary James O. Armitage Center for Hematological Malignancy Research

External Review: Summer 2025 (Report Date: July 1, 2025)

A review of the Center for James O. Armitage Center for Hematological Malignancy Research (JOACHMR) was conducted in June 2025. The review team membership was led by the UNMC Vice Chancellor for Research.

Center Mission: The purpose of the JOACHMR is to bring together physicians, scientists, students, post-doctoral fellows, and support personnel in a multidisciplinary manner to enhance the medical research and clinical care in hematologic malignancies.

Assessment: Strengths: Patients with hematologic malignancies make up a substantial percentage (24%) of the patients seen and treated in the Fred & Pamela Buffett Cancer Center. The Center has supported an intentional shift in recruitment in lymphoma and specific, strategic areas of focus: gene and cellular therapy, immune-microbiome interplay, and novel technologies for minimal residual disease detection for assessment of hematologic neoplasms that occur with excess risk in Nebraska. Extramural Funding. Members received 326 awards valued at \$34.7M during the reporting period. These awards were a mix of federal and non-federal (industry) sponsored, reflecting a healthy funding portfolio. A critical component of the JOACHMR mission is advancing technologies for interventional and non-interventional trials, naturally necessitating partnerships with industry, which the Center has particularly excelled at in the reporting period. Several members of the Center have been instrumental to the success of broader implementation of cellular therapy technologies, leading to UNMC infusing the 1st patient in the world with an allogeneic CAR-T for Lupus. This poises UNMC to lead National/International clinical trials and enhances opportunities for integration of translational research into studies and investigator-initiated clinical trials (IIT). Scholarly Activity & Development. JOACHMR members had 425 publications during the reporting period. Administration. The Center transitioned directorship and is now co-led by Dr. Matthew Lunning (Hematology/Oncology) and Dr. Joe Khoury (Pathology). Membership. JOACHMR has more than 40 members with diverse specialties in Adult and Pediatric Hematology/Oncology, Pathology, Genetics and Cell Biology, Human Genetics Lab, Pharmacy, Nursing, and the Fred & Pamela Buffett Cancer Center. The JOACHMR has a multi-disciplinary approach integrating research and clinical care for patients with these diseases.

<u>Areas of improvement</u>: JOACHMR would be competitive for and should be encouraged to apply for a large, programmatic grant (e.g., lymphoma SPORE grant from NCI) and/or lead a national/international clinical trial network. The Center should also consider trainee pipelines for industry engagement, strategies to support IITs, structured integration of translational expertise, and an emphasis on community engagement.

Recommendations: Center status should be retained.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Progress towards these recommendations will be the responsibility of the Associate Dean of Research, College of Medicine, and Vice Chancellor for Research.

External Review Summary Nebraska Center for Substance Abuse Research

Progress Review: Summer 2025 (Report Date: July 1, 2025)

An external review of the Nebraska Center for Substance Abuse Research (NCSAR) was conducted in summer 2025. The review team membership* was composed of the UNMC Vice Chancellor for Research and reviewers external to the NU system**.

Center Mission: To alleviate the burden of substance abuse and, thereby, healthcare costs in the state of Nebraska through innovative, collaborative research, premier education programs, top-notch quality patient care, and outreach to the drug-abusing/underserved populations.

Assessment: Strengths: The scientific focus of the center is highly relevant to Nebraska, as approximately 10% of the population aged 12 or older struggles with substance use disorders. Extramural Funding. NSCAR investigators have been awarded more than \$46M in NIH grants and non-profit awards during the reporting period. Scholarly Activity & Development. NSCAR's strength in mentoring junior investigators is evidenced by multiple early-career faculty securing independent NIH grants. Members published more than 120 peer-reviewed publications during the reporting period. Administration. NCSAR has a well-defined administrative structure with dedicated operational support, ensuring efficient use of resources, rapid decision-making, and sustained interdisciplinary collaboration. Uniquely, the Center also leverages collaborations with other BOR Centers and large, federal grant programs (2 NIH COBREs, 1 NIH P50) to reduce administrative burden with parallel, scientific review committees and maximize collaboration. Membership. The Center has 41 faculty members at UNMC (6+ departments), UNL, UNO, VA, throughout the US, and internationally.

Areas of improvement: The Center may benefit from a standing, formalized advisory structure (e.g., an internal or external scientific advisory board) to guide strategic priorities and assess emerging opportunities. Additionally, while outreach to underrepresented communities and rural Nebraska has been initiated, a structured evaluation of outreach impact could help refine future efforts. NCSAR could explore entrepreneurial partnerships with biotech and pharma companies, particularly around biomarker development and digital health solutions for addiction. Hosting annual symposia with community stakeholders, trainees, and policy leaders would foster broader engagement and position NCSAR as a regional thought leader in addiction science and public health. Strengthening the existing neurobiological expertise may further improve the center's outcomes in its next phase. Adding neuroscientists who are trained or have a strong research background in molecular, synaptic, and/or circuitry neurobiology will significantly strengthen the team's power in elucidating the underlying neural mechanism.

Recommendation: Center status should be retained.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Progress toward addressing these recommendations will be the responsibility of the Center Director, Associate Dean for the Research College of Medicine, and the Office of Vice Chancellor for Research.

University of Nebraska at Omaha - Aviation Institute

Center Review Report March 1, 2025

The University of Nebraska at Omaha (UNO) Aviation Institute (AI) offers a Bachelor of Science in Aviation with Concentrations in Professional Flight, Air Transport Administration, and Uncrewed Aircraft Systems. Our Professional Flight Concentration is the largest by a significant factor.

Center Mission: The Aviation Institute's mission is to provide a supportive and rigorous academic environment where students develop the skills, knowledge, and experiences necessary for rewarding careers in aviation and transportation. The Institute engages in research aimed at improving the safety, security, efficiency, sustainability, and mobility of aviation and transportation services, benefiting both the state of Nebraska and the broader aviation community.

Assessment: Research continues to be a focus area for several faculty within the Aviation Institute. The Aeronautical Resilience Innovation Advancement Lab started in 2024. This lab provides collaborative research, education, and industry engagement to stimulate ideas and transform rigorous research to proactively improve aeronautical resilience through safety, operations, and sustainability. The faculty and staff of the Aviation Institute are deeply engaged in service at national, international, university, and departmental levels. Faculty members have held leadership roles and contributed to organizations such as the University Aviation Association, Women in Aviation, Alpha Eta Rho, the National Intercollegiate Flying Association, and the Nebraska Aeronautics Commission. The UNO Flight Team, the Flying Mavs, has qualified for the National Intercollegiate Flying Association (NIFA) nationals for 16 consecutive years and has placed in the top ten for the past five years.

The Aviation Institute is currently experiencing unprecedented growth. From 2010 until 2022, the Aviation Institute averaged a 10% increase in the number of majors. At the start of the 2024 AY, the Institute had 377 majors, with 284 in our flight concentration. In 2014, we had 66 students in our flight concentration. That is a 330% increase in students in our flight concentration in 10 years. The university has supported the Aviation Institute with five new faculty lines and one additional staff line to facilitate this growth.

Recommendation: The director recommends that the Aviation Institute Center be retained based on its current performance, growth, and contributions to the aviation community. The Senior Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and the Associate Vice Chancellor for Research and Creative Activity have reviewed this report and concur with the recommendation to retain.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Mr. Scott Vlasek, the Aviation Institute's director, is responsible for monitoring progress on these initiatives and ensuring the continued advancement of the Institute.





University of Nebraska at Omaha - Center for Innovation in Arts Education

An Internal Review of the Center for Innovation in Arts Education was conducted on January 14th, 2025. The review team membership* was composed of Center Director Jeremy Johnson, Center Faculty member Kristen Applegate and Assistant Director of the School of the Arts, Russ Nordman.

Center Mission: The Center Innovation in Arts Education mission is to provide a permanent institutional base for leadership in arts education. The center organizes, facilitates, and collaborates on arts education projects with PreK-16 educators, arts intuitions, and organizations on the local, state, and national level." The academic focus of the center strives to fulfill its mission of innovation and effective leadership in arts education in both theory and practice and in professional and curricular development."

Assessment: The Center for Innovation in Arts Education has a lot of positive things going for it. The first is the addition of Instructor, Kristen Applegate, who has new ideas in how to expand the mission of the center. The center also has numerous projects, in various stages of completion. For example, the on-going *Sensory* project that has the center teaching art to blind and visually impaired community members combined with an accessible gallery exhibition, a cross-college project with Biomechanics designing biomechanical adaptive art tools for children in schools. Additionally, the center is supporting the Nebraska Art Teachers Association Spring Student Symposium which is focused on giving preservice teachers in the state the opportunity to work with multi-ability clients in a community center setting. The center does have some weaknesses though. First, its leadership does not receive any stipend unlike other centers across campus. Second, the center has largely focused on creating and developing projects for the local and state level. To move to the national level in recognition, it would best serve the center if its faculty published its results and credited the center with support. Finally, given budget constraints at the unit and university levels the center would be wise to seek funding through grants on a regular basis at the local, state, and national level to fund its projects.

Recommendations: After reviewing the past and current projects, it is the determination of the committee that the "<u>Center status should be retained</u>." The Senior Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and the Associate Vice Chancellor for Research and Creative Activity have reviewed this report and concur with the recommendation to retain.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Progress towards addressing these recommendations will be the responsibility of Dr. Jeremy Johnson. Dr. Johnson will provide to the direct supervisors (unit coordinator and Director of the School of the Arts) an annual report summarizing the activities of the center and its accomplishments.

University of Nebraska at Omaha – Center for Public Affairs Research Center Review Report March 1, 2025

An internal operational review of the UNO Center for Public Affairs Research (CPAR) was conducted in the Spring of 2025 by the Director and Assistant Director. The review was shared with all full-time members of CPAR and the Dean and Associate Dean for Research of the College of Public Affairs and Community Service.

Center Mission: The mission of CPAR is to collaboratively produce and disseminate high-quality public scholarship about topics that impact the lives of Nebraskans. CPAR is guided by four core values in this work: collaboration, purpose, aspiration, and research integrity.

Assessment: CPAR's **strengths** over the past five years have been driven by our externally funded research and outreach efforts, including:

- More than 60 contracted or grant-funded projects totaling over \$4 million, with key
 partners such as the Governor's Office, Nebraska Department of Economic
 Development, Nebraska State Chamber of Commerce & Industry, Greater Omaha
 Chamber, Nebraska Legislature's Planning Committee, Nebraska Community
 Foundation, Nebraska Department of Transportation, and Nebraska Investment Finance
 Authority.
- Over 200 media mentions in local, state, and national news outlets across print, radio, podcasts, and television.
- **More than 160 invited presentations** delivered by CPAR staff to state, local, and nonprofit agencies, including two presentations to the Nebraska Board of Regents.
- An annual professional development series, the *Data and Research Series for Community Impact*, conducted in collaboration with the U.S. Census Bureau as part of our designation as Nebraska's State Data Center, with over 1,300 participants over the past five years.

Since 2020, CPAR has experienced significant growth across key metrics. However, this progress comes with **challenges**. CPAR relies on funding from grants and external partnerships, and in recent years, our portion of state funding has declined. As funding shifts continue, including reductions in both federal and state support, our ability to conduct research at the highest level over the long term could be impacted. Additionally, the center is operating at full capacity with existing staff (5 FTE), making it difficult to take on additional projects or proactively pursue new funding opportunities while maintaining the same level of excellence. While CPAR has a strong track record of delivering high-quality research, sustaining and expanding its impact will require thoughtful planning and additional resources to meet growing demand.

Recommendation: The center should be retained. Future goals for the organization include expanding CPAR's regional and national reputation as a hub for community-engaged research and best practices in evidence-informed governance. Additionally, CPAR aims to increase the number of multi-year funding commitments secured by positioning itself as an essential long-





term partner rather than a resource for ad hoc projects. Diversifying funding sources by engaging philanthropic organizations, foundations, and private sector sponsors who benefit from CPAR's data and insights will further support sustainability. The Senior Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and the Associate Vice Chancellor for Research and Creative Activity have reviewed this report and concur with the recommendation to retain.

Responsibility for Monitoring: To ensure CPAR's continued impact, we will undertake a broader strategic planning effort with external stakeholders. Progress towards addressing these recommendations will be the responsibility of the Director and Assistant Director of CPAR, as well as the Dean and Associate Dean for Research of the College of Public Affairs and Community Service.



University of Nebraska at Omaha – Center for Research in Human Movement Variability Center Review Report March 1, 2025

An operational review of the University of Nebraska at Omaha (UNO) Center for Research in Human Variability (MOVCENTR) was conducted in September 2024. The review team membership was composed of Dr. Nikolaos Stergiou (Director of the UNO MOVCENTR); Dr. Brian Knarr (Co-Director of the UNO MOVCENTR); Jeffrey Kaipust (Assistant Director of the UNO MOVCENTR); and Nicholas Reynolds (COBRE Administrative Coordinator of the UNO MOVCENTR).

Center Mission: The MOVCENTR is an NIH-supported Center of Biomedical Research Excellence (COBRE). Its mission is to support research that will improve our understanding of the changes in human movement variability so that we can develop mechanism-based interventions focused on restoring variability. These interventions could be used to treat a variety of movement disorders by addressing the neuromuscular system's optimal coordination and adaptability.

Assessment: Notable successes of the MOVCENTR: Through our Research Project Leader (RPL) program, we have funded 6 RPLs in Phase 1 (2014-2019) and 7 RPLs in Phase 2 (2019-2024). Al RPLs were UNO Junior Faculty Members. This program allowed them to have at least 50% of their time dedicated to research, plus graduate students and equipment support for at least 3 years. Through our Pilot Project Program, we awarded 13 awards to early career Nebraska investigators. Several of them have been receiving these awards for over a year. Our 13 Research Project Leaders secured \$29.1 million, and our 13 Pilot Project Leaders \$25.5 million in funding since their COBRE appointments. An economic impact evaluation determined that since 2019, the start of Phase 2, our COBRE has had a \$27.5 million impact on the Omaha metropolitan community. We have established the first three UNO research cores: Movement Analysis (MOVAN), Quantitative Analysis Research (QuARC), and Machining and Prototyping (MAPRO) Cores. These are unique cores for the state of Nebraska.

Future Goals: Acquire NIH funding for Phase 3 to a) solidify successfully established MOVCENTR research programs and infrastructure built in prior COBRE phases, and b) implement strategies to advance MOVCENTR research excellence in human movement variability beyond COBRE funding through interactions with other Centers, sustainability of our scientific Cores, and the institutional commitment to the Center via new faculty and UNO and CEHHS financial support.

Areas for Growth: Establish a fully independent and sustainable research center and research cores. Enhance the visibility of MOVCENTR and its capabilities and successes.

Recommendations: Center status should be retained. The reviewers of the MOVCENTR unanimously recommended that MOVCENTR moves forward with the resubmission of our Phase 3 application to the NIH. The Senior Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and the Associate Vice Chancellor for Research and Creative Activity have reviewed this report and concur with the recommendation to retain.

Responsibility for Monitoring: The Director of the MOVCENTR, Dr. Nick Stergiou, and Mr. Nicholas Reynolds, his COBRE Administrative Coordinator, will be responsible for monitoring progress and submitting the Research Progress Performance Report (RPPR) to the NIH.





University of Nebraska at Omaha – William Brennan Institute for Labor Studies Center Review Report March 1, 2025

A review of the UNO William Brennan Institute for Labor Studies (WBILS) was conducted on February 3, 2025. The review team consisted of UNO College of Public Affairs and Community Service (CPACS) directors and faculty.

Center Mission: The UNO WBILS's mission is "to serve the education and training needs of wage earners and their labor organizations." The Institute opened its doors on July 1, 1980, as the result of the combined efforts of the Nebraska labor movement and the University of Nebraska to foster creative and critical thinking among labor leaders, potential leaders, and interested members by providing relevant information and training in the skills needed in today's changing economy and workplace.

Assessment: As the flagship labor studies institute in Nebraska, WBILS has had a positive impact on UNO and CPACS. In addition to offering non-credit courses to local labor unions and its members and presenting to approximately 1,000 learners on an annual basis at various events throughout the state, WBILS has collaborated with the UNO Center for Public Affairs Research (CPAR) to study union membership and participation in Nebraska and to better understand members attitudes toward unions and union efficacy. Also, WBILS hosts an annual conference each spring to invite union and community leaders to discuss important topics that affect us all; recent conference themes included *Advancing Human Immigration Reform*, and the *Future of Work*. WBILS began a fun partnership with Film Streams to invite the community to a film viewing and panel discussion in the week leading up to Labor Day to celebrate workers in this country and discuss critical issues as they relate to the union movement. WBILS also began a podcast titled *What Does Labor Want?* to meet union leaders and to learn about how they came to join the union and the challenges they face.

Recommendations: The William Brennan Institute for Labor Studies should be retained. The review committee was unanimous, recommending that WBILS continue to grow the Institute in the areas of 1) offering affordable programs to union members and any Nebraskan wishing to be educated on the value of unions; 2) broadening its appeal in its efforts to connect with other colleges/departments within UNO to educate students on the historical value of unions; 3) collaborating with community organizations to collectively strengthen those who need advocacy. The Senior Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and the Associate Vice Chancellor for Research and Creative Activity have reviewed this report and concur with the recommendation to retain.

Responsibility for Monitoring: Progress towards addressing these recommendations will be the responsibility of the Director of the William Brennan Institute for Labor Studies, and the Dean of the College of Public Affairs and Community Service.

- UNK BS Information Technology and Networking Comprehensive (CCPE receives its next report in June 2028)
 - Information Networking and Telecommunications. After the in-depth review, the department updated the curriculum as a broader technical degree, focusing on networking systems and backend web development. They also removed the empasis areas in favor of a broad list of electives so students could customize the program to their interests and career goals. The program is now known as the Bachelor of Science in Information Technology and Networking Comprehensive. This reworked program combined key elements of the individual areas to lay the foundation for digital communication and in just its second year under the new format, already has 16 majors.

PURPOSE & KEY POINTSs

Beginning in July 2023, Nebraska Medicine began providing athletic medicine services pursuant to an athletic medicine services agreement between Nebraska Athletics and UNMC Physicians. In July 2024, Nebraska Medicine became the official health care partner of Husker Athletics. During the 2024-2025 academic year, Nebraska Athletics engaged in a review of its athletic medicine structure and the services and support provided to its student-athletes. As a result of the review, Nebraska Athletics decided to expand its partnership with Nebraska Medicine and entered into a two-year clinic lease and athletic medicine services agreement with The Nebraska Medical Center. This agreement expands the partnership between Nebraska Athletics and Nebraska Medicine and provides Nebraska Athletics additional orthopedic and administrative services, including the identification and creation of a network of orthopedic surgeons available for services in a range of orthopedic subspecialities through physician services agreements. As compensation for these services, Nebraska Athletics will pay Nebraska Medicine a total of \$1,849,204 per year, less the trade amount for sponsorship opportunities provided to Nebraska Medicine. After the first year of the clinic agreement, the parties will reevaluate and potentially renegotiate the fee for athletic medicine services in good faith. Total aggregate spend under this agreement during the two-year term is anticipated to be around \$1,600,000.

NEBRASKA MEDICINE HUSKER ATHLETICS CLINIC CLINIC OPERATING AGREEMENT

THIS CLINIC OPERATING AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is between The Nebraska Medical Center, a Nebraska nonprofit corporation ("Nebraska Medicine"), and the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska ("University"), a public body corporate and governing body of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln ("UNL") Department of Intercollegiate Athletics ("Athletics").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Athletics has an athletic medicine clinic to provide certain athletic related medical services to UNL students who are on an active roster and/or are receiving athletic grantin-aid, Designated Student-Athletes ("DSA") as defined under the House v. NCAA Settlement, or a member of the spirit squad ("Athletes").

WHEREAS, Nebraska Medicine provides health care services through its operation of a medical center and clinics.

WHEREAS, Athletics desires to contract with Nebraska Medicine to establish an athletic medicine clinic through which it will provide athletic medicine and related services to Athletes.

WHEREAS, Nebraska Medicine desires to operate a Nebraska Medicine athletics clinic on the UNL campus (the "NM Clinic") in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Term; Termination</u>. The term ("Term") of this Agreement shall commence on July 1, 2025 and shall continue for a period of two (2) years from the date thereof (the "Term"). Notwithstanding the stated terms, either party may terminate this Agreement (a) upon thirty (30) days written notice in the event of a breach of this Agreement by the other party, which remains uncured for such thirty (30) day period; (b) upon one hundred and eighty (180) days written notice to the other party, without showing of cause; (c) at any time by mutual agreement between the parties or (d) as otherwise provided herein.
- 2. <u>Clinic Lease</u>. Athletics hereby leases to Nebraska Medicine that space depicted in <u>Exhibit A</u> ("Leased Premises") for the operation of the NM Clinic in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth below. The Leased Premises is located at 800 Stadium Drive, Lincoln, NE 68588 (the "Building"), Nebraska Medicine shall also have the non-exclusive right to use the common areas within and around the Building, including the parking areas, in conjunction with use by UNL, and its guests, tenants and invitees.
 - a. <u>Condition of Leased Premises</u>. Athletics will deliver the Leased Premises in its present "as is" condition. Athletics shall have no obligation to make any repairs or improvements to the Leased Premises, except as specifically provided in this Agreement.
 - b. Utilities. Athletics at its sole cost, shall cause utilities and services necessary

for the operation of the NM Clinic to be provided to the Leased Premises twenty-four (24) hours per day, seven (7) days per week. Such utilities and services shall include, but not be limited to, natural gas, electricity, water, sanitary sewer, heating, ventilation and air conditioning, plumbing, lighting, internet and elevator services. Athletics shall not be liable to Nebraska Medicine or any person or party for any damage to or loss of personal property or damage to the Leased Premises, or the fixtures or improvements therein, arising from any act of any other persons, nor shall Athletics be liable for the interruption or loss to Nebraska Medicine's business arising from any of the above described causes.

- c. Maintenance and Repairs of the Leased Premises. Athletics shall have sole responsibility for ordinary repair and maintenance of the Leased Premises. Notwithstanding the previous sentence, Nebraska Medicine shall be responsible for the cost of any repair to the Leased Premises to the extent the Leased Premises is damaged by the negligent act or omission of Nebraska Medicine or its employees, agents, or contractors. Nebraska Medicine shall notify Athletics of any such damage, and Athletics shall make such repairs at the sole cost and expense of Nebraska Medicine. Nebraska Medicine shall keep the Leased Premises in a clean, neat, sanitary and safe condition. Without disturbing Nebraska Medicine's use of the Building, Athletics hereby expressly reserves the right, exercisable at any time and from time to time, to erect, use, maintain and repair pipes, conduits, plumbing, vents, ducts and wires in, to, under and through the Leased Premises as and to the extent that Athletics may now or hereafter deem to be necessary or appropriate for the proper operation and maintenance of the Building.
- d. <u>Improvements</u>. Except as provided in this Agreement, Nebraska Medicine shall make no alterations to the Leased Premises without the prior written consent of Athletics, which Athletics may withhold in its reasonable discretion. Notwithstanding any consent by Athletics, Nebraska Medicine shall have no right to cause any liens to be placed upon the Leased Premises or Building.

e. Access.

- i. Athletics shall provide Nebraska Medicine 24/7 access to the Leased Premises and shall provide access to the Building for Nebraska Medicine's invitees during NM Clinic hours.
- ii. During normal lunch-time hours of operation, Physicians staffing the NM Clinic may access the Lewis Training Table. Athletics shall annually provide Physicians staffing the NM Clinic the same access that is provided to Athletics employees. Physicians staffing the NM Clinic shall pay any associated costs to Athletics third-party provider for any meals received at Lewis Training Table above and beyond this access.
- iii. Physicians staffing the NM Clinic will be offered the same parking privileges as provided to UNL employees, which will consist of the opportunity to purchase a parking permit for UNL parking lot or garage

at Nebraska Medicine or the Physician's expense; provided, however, Physicians who are dually employed through Nebraska Medicine and the University of Nebraska Medical Center ("UNMC") shall receive reciprocity for parking if they have a current parking sticker on their vehicle for Nebraska Medicine or UNMC facilities.

- f. <u>Control</u>. The Building shall at all times be under the control of Athletics which shall have the right at all times to enter the premises to examine the same and to perform Athletics' duties. This Agreement does not require Athletics to relinquish its right to control, enforce rules, or otherwise manage and operate the Building, including the Leased Premises.
- g. <u>Security</u>. Athletics, at its sole cost, shall provide security services for the Leased Premises.
- h. General Cleaning and Medical/Hazardous Wastes.
 - i. Athletics will provide medical, special, and infectious waste removal services for the Leased Premises. Athletics shall comply with all federal, state and local laws, regulations and ordinances which govern the use, storage and handling of hazardous substances, wastes, or materials and medical, special or infectious wastes.
 - ii. Athletics shall be responsible for all general cleaning and janitorial services for the Leased Premises. Such services shall be provided by either non-student UNL employees or a contracted janitorial company. The UNL employees or janitorial company will be directed to sign Nebraska Medicine confidentiality agreements if so required by Nebraska Medicine.
- i. <u>Furniture</u>, <u>Fixtures and Equipment</u>. Athletics shall generally furnish all furniture, fixtures, major medical equipment and assets necessary to operate the NM Clinic. Nebraska Medicine shall have the responsibility for ordinary repair and maintenance of all furniture, fixtures and medical equipment located within the Leased Premises. Nebraska Medicine shall annually provide Athletics with recommendations for medical equipment or assets to enhance the quality of care, delivery of services, and operation of the NM Clinic.
- j. <u>Personal Property</u>. Nebraska Medicine may furnish personal property, office furniture, or equipment necessary to operate the NM Clinic. All aforementioned items shall be labeled as the property of Nebraska Medicine.
- k. <u>Property Removal Upon Termination</u>. On or before the effective date of the termination of this Agreement, Nebraska Medicine shall remove Nebraska Medicine's personal property from the Leased Premises and otherwise vacate the Leased Premises and the Building and leave the Leased Premises clean

and in good order and condition (reasonable wear and tear excepted). Athletics is authorized to remove from the Leased Premises any property which may remain in the Leased Premises at the expense of Nebraska Medicine upon termination. The University shall not be liable for any damages or loss to said property which may be sustained, either by reason of removal or the place to which it may be removed, and the University is expressly released from any and all claims for damage of whatever kind or nature. Time is of the essence with respect to this section.

I. Property and Commercial Insurance; Waiver of Subrogation.

- i. Nebraska Medicine shall obtain and maintain at its sole cost and expense during the Term of this Agreement the following minimum insurance coverages: (i) commercial general liability with a limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate and (ii) "all risk" property insurance covering not less than the full replacement cost of Nebraska Medicine's personal property located on the Leased Premises; and cyber liability coverage of not less than \$7.5 million per occurrence and in the aggregate. All insurance coverages may be furnished under Nebraska Medicine's "blanket" policies of insurance. At the University's request, Nebraska Medicine shall provide the University evidence of the foregoing forms of coverage.
- ii. The University, at its sole cost, shall carry or cause to be carried such insurance in amounts and with deductibles as a reasonably prudent landlord would purchase and maintain with respect to the Building and the Leased Premises against loss or damage by fire and such other risks as are customarily covered by extended coverage endorsement, with insurance carriers or companies as determined by the University within its reasonable discretion.
- iii. If at any time during the term of this Agreement, the Building is materially damaged by any casualty, the University shall have no obligation to rebuild the damaged Building. If the University elects not to so rebuild, then this Agreement shall terminate as of the date of the damage and Nebraska Medicine shall promptly remove all damaged personal property and equipment owned by Nebraska Medicine from the Leased Premises. If the University elects to repair such damage, Nebraska Medicine may either terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days' notice to the University, in which event this Agreement will terminate at the end of such thirty (30) day period, or may continue to lease the Leased Premises pursuant to the terms contained herein. In the event the Building or the Leased Premises is non-materially damaged, the University shall promptly repair the same to substantially its condition as existed prior to the damage, other than for any Nebraska Medicine's Improvements, which shall be the responsibility of Nebraska Medicine to restore.

- iv. The University hereby releases Nebraska Medicine from any liability for damage or destruction to the Leased Premises or any other portion of the Building, whether or not caused by acts or omissions of Nebraska Medicine, its employees, agents or contractors, and the University hereby waives any and all claims and right of recovery against Nebraska Medicine, its employees, agents and/or contractors, for damage, loss or injury caused by or resulting from fire and/or other perils, to the extent that any such claims for damages, losses or injuries are or would be covered by any property insurance policies which the University actually maintains. Nebraska Medicine hereby releases the University from any liability for damage or destruction to property, whether or not caused by acts or omissions of the University, its employees, agents or contractors, and Nebraska Medicine hereby waives any and all claims and right of recovery against the University, its employees, agents and/or contractors, for damage, loss or injury caused by or resulting from fire and/or other perils, to the extent that any such claim for damages, losses or injuries are or would be covered by any property insurance policies which Nebraska Medicine does or is required to maintain hereunder. UNL and Nebraska Medicine shall each look to their respective insurance coverage for recovery of any insured property damage. Each party shall obtain from its respective insurance company a consent to this mutual waiver of subrogation/release of rights of recovery against the other party, so as to prevent the invalidation of insurance coverage by reason of this mutual waiver of subrogation/release, and shall provide the other party a copy of any such consent. Both parties agree to immediately give each insurance company which has issued to it policies of property insurance written notice of the terms of such mutual waivers and to cause such insurance policies to be properly endorsed, if necessary, to prevent the invalidation thereof by reason of such waivers and shall furnish to the other party a certificate of insurance or other written evidence of such endorsement or that such endorsement is not required.
- 3. Clinic Operations. Nebraska Medicine shall be responsible for the following:
 - a. <u>Provision of Athletic Medicine Services</u>. During the terms of this Agreement, Nebraska Medicine shall furnish the following health care services through the NM Clinic and at Event Coverage as described in Exhibit B to the following individuals:
 - Patients Served. The NM Clinic will primarily serve Athletes and may provide urgent care to other members of the athletics community as mutually agreed to by the parties.
 - ii. Covered Athletic Medicine Services. Nebraska Medicine shall provide

athletic medicine services further described in Exhibit B, attached hereto, which shall initially be referred to as "Covered Athletic Medicine Services" to all Athletes. UNL and Nebraska Medicine shall annually review and agree on any addition to or deletion of specific Covered Athletic Medicine Services provided by Nebraska Medicine at the NM Clinic. Nebraska Medicine shall not submit bills for the payment of the Covered Athletic Medicine Services (including treatment) to the Athletes, their parents or guardians as applicable, or any third-party payor.

- b. <u>Clinic Personnel</u>. Nebraska Medicine shall furnish necessary physicians, non-physician practitioners, nurses, and other personnel to function under the general supervision of Nebraska Medicine and to provide Covered Athletic Medicine Services (each physician providing Covered Athletic Medicine Services, a "Physician"). In recognition of developing trust with providers and continuity of care, Nebraska Medicine will ensure it provides the same Physicians consistently when staffing the NM Clinic, with limited exceptions such as Physician illnesses and planned vacations. Nebraska Medicine will seek input from Nebraska Athletics as it pertains to Physicians, including seeking input as it relates to performance reviews and any hiring decisions related to this Agreement. Nebraska Medicine will also seek input from Athletics as it relates to job descriptions for Clinic staff. The parties understand all hiring decisions will be left to Nebraska Medicine. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Nebraska Medicine agrees to remove and replace any Clinic staff upon the reasonable request of Athletics.
- c. All health care and administrative personnel furnished by Nebraska Medicine must continuously meet the following individual qualifications:
 - i. Be currently licensed and permitted by Nebraska, to the extent required, to provide all Covered Athletic Medicine Services.
 - ii. Not be excluded under the Federal Medicare and State Medicaid programs.
 - iii. Be covered under Nebraska Medicine's policies or programs of general liability, professional liability and workers compensation coverage, or under other policies of equal coverage.
 - iv. Be employed or otherwise furnished by or under the authority of Nebraska Medicine.
- d. <u>Chief Medical Director</u>. Ross Mathiasen, M.D., shall serve as the Team Physician, Chief Medical Director for Athletics. As an employee of Nebraska Medicine, Dr. Mathiasen shall report to the Chief Medical Officer of Nebraska Medicine, Harris Frankel, M.D., or his successor. Dr. Mathiasen will also work

closely with the Athletics Director or his or her designee, and will be responsible for providing administrative oversight of the delivery of Athlete healthcare and compliance with all pertinent NCAA health and safety legislation. Such administrative oversight will be in coordination with the Associate AD of Athletic Medicine. Dr. Frankel or his successor will seek input from the Athletics Director or his or her designee in all practices related to annual goal-setting, performance reviews, and, in the event Dr. Mathiasen is no longer the Team Physician, Chief Medical Director, any future hiring decisions for the position.

- e. <u>Leased Clinic Personnel</u>. UNL employs individuals who may need to be leased to Nebraska Medicine from time to time for the performance of services at the NM Clinic and such arrangement shall be governed by the terms of the <u>Exhibit</u> C, attached hereto.
- f. <u>Consent to Treat</u>. To the extent required by law, Nebraska Medicine shall be responsible to obtain patient, and in the case of minor students, necessary parental or guardian, consent prior to rendering Covered Athletic Medicine Services.
- g. <u>Clinic Policies and Procedures</u>. The NM Clinic shall operate in accordance with Nebraska Medicine's general policies and procedures applicable to all of its clinic locations and any NM Clinic-specific policies developed by Nebraska Medicine.
- h. Administration, Medical Direction, Services; Indemnification. Nebraska Medicine shall be responsible to provide all administrative supervision and oversight of the NM Clinic, all medical direction of NM Clinic staff and services, and all Covered Athletic Medicine Services furnished in and through the NM Clinic. The NM Clinic shall operate as a health clinic of Nebraska Medicine. Nebraska Medicine shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the University and its respective Board of Regents, employees, and agents from all third party claims, causes of action, damages, whether to person (including death) or property, costs (including reasonable attorneys' fees), and losses (collectively "Loss") to the extent the Loss arises out of the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of Nebraska Medicine in association with this the Covered Athletic Medicine Services provided pursuant to this Agreement. No compromise or settlement of any such claim shall be made without the prior written consent of the University unless otherwise required by final decree of a court of competent jurisdiction. The University shall permit Nebraska Medicine, at Nebraska Medicine's sole option and expense, to assume the complete defense of such Loss, including selection of counsel, provided the University shall have the right to participate in the defense of such Loss at its own cost and expense.
- i. <u>Independent Medical Judgment</u>. Nebraska Medicine providers shall apply their independent professional medical judgment to the performance of the Covered Athletic Medicine Services and these providers shall control the manner by which such providers perform the Covered Athletic Medicine Services

hereunder. In no event shall Nebraska Medicine be prevented or restricted from applying their independent professional medical judgment. Notwithstanding the foregoing, this provision shall not be construed to limit Athletics' ability to establish protocols, procedures or standards for itself.

- j. <u>Collaboration with Providers</u>. Nebraska Medicine agrees to work collaboratively with other Nebraska Athletics' providers, including but not limited to athletic training, orthopedic, chiropractic, sports psychology, and massage therapist providers when providing Covered Athletic Medicine Services. Collaboration will include regular communication among these providers to ensure providers work together in a timely manner to provide seamless, high-quality care to Athletes.
- k. <u>Supplies and Instrumentation</u>. Athletics shall provide all disposable items, pharmaceuticals, samples, and other consumable supplies and all instruments needed to operate the NM Clinic.
- Nondiscrimination. Nebraska Medicine agrees to provide all Covered Athletic Medicine Services to Athletes without regard to race, color, sex, age, handicapping condition, or other factors unrelated to the Athlete's need for Covered Athletic Medicine Services and NM Clinic's ability to provide such Covered Athletic Medicine Services.
- m. <u>Licensure</u>, <u>Accreditation and Regulatory Review</u>. Nebraska Medicine shall participate in any review processes conducted by the State of Nebraska, applicable accreditation committees, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services and its contractors and all other entities that license, accredit, or regulate the NM Clinic; and Nebraska Medicine shall implement such action as is necessary to comply with the requirements of such licensing, accrediting, and regulatory entities with respect to the NM Clinic.
- n. <u>Insurance Obligations</u>. Nebraska Medicine shall at all times maintain and pay all premiums on the following insurance coverages:
 - i. <u>Professional Liability</u>. Professional liability coverage for Nebraska Medicine and its staff in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$3,000,000 aggregate per policy year, through insurance companies authorized to do business in Nebraska. Nebraska Medicine may satisfy this obligation with respect to coverage of its own staff through a combination of insurance and coverage under the Nebraska Hospital-Medical Liability Act (for eligible personnel).
 - ii. Workers Compensation. Statutory Worker's Compensation Insurance and Employer's Liability Insurance as follows: (i) \$500,000 per accident, (ii) \$500,000 disease policy limit; and (iii) \$500,000 disease, each employee.

- 4. <u>Compensation</u>. In consideration for the obligations of each of the parties provided herein, the parties agree that:
 - a. Athletics shall pay to Nebraska Medicine a total of \$1,849,204.00 per year paid in quarterly increments, less the Trade Amount (defined below), for the provision of the Covered Athletic Medicine Services (the "Fee"). Upon the Agreement's first anniversary, the parties agree to reevaluate and potentially renegotiate the Fee in good faith based upon the circumstances at that time; and
 - b. In consideration of the Covered Athletic Medicine Services furnished by Nebraska Medicine at the NM Clinic, the fees owed by Athletics to Nebraska Medicine for the Fee pursuant to this Agreement shall be exchanged for and applied to sponsorship opportunities (the "Trade Amount") provided to Nebraska Medicine at an amount up to the payment listed in the Exclusive Qualified Corporate Sponsorship Agreement between Athletics and Nebraska Medicine (the "Sponsorship Agreement"). The parties hereby agree that the exchange of sponsorship rights for this Trade Amount is intended to be, and the parties acknowledge and agree that it is, commercially reasonable and consistent with fair market value based on the sponsorship rights to be provided to Nebraska Medicine and its affiliates. The parties further acknowledge and agree that the fees owed by Athletics for Nebraska Medicine's Covered Athletic Medicine Services above this Trade Amount will be paid to Nebraska Medicine according to the terms of this Agreement. In the event that the Sponsorship Agreement expires or is terminated by either party, payment owed to Nebraska Medicine pursuant to this Agreement shall no longer be applied to the Trade Amount.

5. Promotion and Signage.

- a. <u>Promotion</u>. In collaboration with Nebraska Medicine, Athletics shall actively promote the Covered Athletic Medicine Services offered at the NM Clinic to Athletes. UNL's website shall be updated to reflect the nature of NM Clinic, and shall accurately reflect the Covered Athletic Medicine Services and Notice of Privacy Practices.
- b. <u>Nebraska Medicine Website</u>. Nebraska Medicine shall not list the NM Clinic as an Immediate Care Clinic, Primary Care Clinic, or other publicly-accessible clinic on any Nebraska Medicine website.
- c. <u>Signage</u>. In collaboration with UNL, Nebraska Medicine shall install and maintain signage on the interior entrance to the Leased Premises clearly designating the NM Clinic as a Nebraska Medicine clinic. Nebraska Medicine will remove the signage upon the expiration of the Term. Nebraska Medicine may not install any other signage within or on the exterior of the Building.

- 6. <u>No Assumption of Agreements</u>. In its operations of the athletic medicine clinic, Athletics may have entered into various services, supplier, and/or other agreements with third parties. Because of its available organization resources, Nebraska Medicine is under no obligation to assume agreements between Athletics and third parties. Athletics is obligated to terminate such agreements at Athletics' sole cost.
- 7. <u>HIPAA and Medical Records</u>. The records created at the NM Clinic are generally subject to the privacy and security requirements of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 and the regulations promulgated thereunder ("HIPAA"). For purposes of this Section of the Agreement, "protected health information" ("PHI") shall have the same meaning used by HIPAA. Neither NM Clinic's location on the UNL campus nor its patient population consisting primarily of UNL students cause the NM Clinic records to be subject to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("FERPA").
 - a. <u>Nebraska Medicine Records</u>. The records created at the NM Clinic will be the property of Nebraska Medicine, and shall be maintained by Nebraska Medicine in its electronic medical record system.
 - b. <u>Nebraska Medicine or UNL Records</u>. Either party may be granted by the other party access to or use of the records in accordance with HIPAA, FERPA, as required by law, or authorized by the patient in accordance with applicable law.
 - c. <u>Authorizations</u>. Nebraska Medicine will obtain from each Athlete a HIPAA-compliant authorization that authorizes Nebraska Medicine to disclose PHI arising from the Athlete to Athletics.
 - d. <u>Reporting.</u> Nebraska Medicine will provide Athletics reports of deidentified and aggregate annual spend by Athletics at the Health Clinic and for orthopedic procedures performed on Athletes at Nebraska Medicine for August 1 through May 31 each year during the Term. Nebraska Medicine shall provide these reports on or before June 1 each year during the Term.
 - e. <u>Notice of Privacy Practices</u>. Nebraska Medicine will use its Notice of Privacy Practices governing the use and disclosures of the NM Clinic records, and must abide by the limitations and restrictions provided therein.
 - f. No Business Associate Relationship. In the event PHI is seen by or impermissibly disclosed to Athletics or its employees or agents, the party discovering such disclosure shall promptly notify the other party and Athletics agrees to promptly take commercially reasonable measures to prevent any subsequent dissemination by Athletics or Athletics' employees or agents of such PHI to third parties. The parties agree that the provisions of this Section do not create, and are not intended to create, a "business associate" relationship between the parties as that term is defined by HIPAA.

- g. <u>Compliance</u>. Nebraska Medicine shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local rules, regulations, statutes, laws and ordinances governing the NM Clinic, including but not limited to facilitating the NM Clinic's accreditation and CMS compliance.
- h. <u>HIPAA.</u> Nebraska Medicine is a Covered Entity as defined under HIPAA. HIPAA training and compliance oversight for the NM Clinic will be provided by Nebraska Medicine.
- 8. <u>Independent Contractor.</u> Athletics and Nebraska Medicine are independent contractors and are not, by virtue of this Agreement, made agents, employees, or joint venturers of each other. Athletics and Nebraska Medicine shall not represent themselves as agents, employees, or joint venturers of one another while acting in accordance with the terms of this Agreement and neither party shall have the ability to contract on behalf of or to obligate the other party in any manner.
- 9. <u>Use of Names and Trademarks</u>. Except as required under Section 5 or pursuant to other contractual relationships between the parties, neither party shall use the name, proprietary marks of or otherwise refer to or identify the other party in any advertising or marketing materials without first securing the written consent of such party.
- 10. <u>Notices</u>. All notices required hereunder shall be in writing, identified by this Agreement and sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, by overnight mail, by facsimile (with proof of transmission to the receiving party's fax number) or by hand delivery to the following:

- 11. <u>Assignment</u>. Neither party may assign, transfer, or subcontract its rights or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other. Subject to the foregoing sentence, all of the provisions of this Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns.
- 12. <u>Governing Law and Venue</u>. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Nebraska, without regard to conflicts of laws principles.
- 13. <u>Informal Dispute Resolution</u>. The parties agree to negotiate in good faith to resolve any dispute between them regarding this Agreement. If informal negotiations do not resolve the dispute to the reasonable satisfaction of both parties, then each party will nominate one senior officer as its representative. These representatives will, within ten (10) days of a written request by either party to call such a meeting, meet in person and will attempt to resolve the dispute in good faith. If the dispute cannot be resolved, the parties agree that they will, if requested in writing by either party, meet within ten (10) days after such written notification for one day with an impartial mediator with both parties sharing the mediator's cost equally. If the parties cannot resolve the dispute in that session, then the dispute resolution process will be deemed to be completed and both parties shall be allowed to pursue their available remedies under applicable law.
- 14. <u>Non-Waiver</u>. No waiver by either party of any default, breach or series of breaches by the other of any of the terms, covenants and conditions of this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of any subsequent breach or waiver of such terms, covenants or conditions generally.
- 15. <u>Severability</u>. Whenever possible, each provision of this Agreement shall be interpreted in such a manner as to be effective and valid under applicable law, but if any provision of this Agreement is held to be prohibited by or invalid under applicable law, such provision shall be ineffective only to the extent of such prohibition or invalidity, without invalidating the remainder of such provisions or the remaining provisions of this Agreement, so long as such invalidity defeats the general purpose of this Agreement. The parties may substitute for such invalid provision a valid provision which most likely approximates the intent and economic effect of the invalid provision.
- 16. <u>Survival</u>. The provisions of this Agreement dealing with confidential information, limitation of liability, indemnification, governing law and any other provisions of which by their nature extend beyond termination or expiration of this Agreement, shall be deemed to survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.
- 17. <u>Headings</u>. The descriptive headings of this Agreement are intended for reference only and shall not affect the construction or interpretation of this Agreement.
- 18. <u>Entire Agreement and Integration</u>. This Agreement represents the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter of this agreement and supersedes all prior agreements, discussions, proposals, representations or warranties, whether written or oral. Unless otherwise provided herein, any other guarantees, representations, or promises shall not be binding on either party unless a written agreement signed by a duly

authorized representative of each party alters the terms of this Agreement.

- 19. <u>No Third-Party Beneficiary</u>. This Agreement is executed for the benefit of the named parties only. Nothing in this Agreement or in the negotiation of this Agreement shall have the effect of conferring any rights or expectations on any third party. No one other than a party to this Agreement or a party's permitted successor or assign shall have the right to enforce any covenant, term or condition in this Agreement.
- 20. <u>Recitals</u>. The recitals are intended to describe the intent of the parties and the circumstances under which this Agreement is executed and shall be considered in the interpretation of this Agreement.
- 21. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, but all of which, taken together, shall constitute one and the same agreement.
- 22. <u>Cooperation Regarding Claims and Litigation</u>. The parties agree that to the extent permitted by their respective professional liability insurance programs and subject to attorney-client privilege and attorney work product protection, they shall provide each other with full cooperation in assisting each other, and their duly authorized officers, employees, agents, representatives and attorneys, in investigating, defending or prosecuting incidents involving circumstances which occurred during the term of this Agreement, including those which were not raised until after termination of this Agreement. This section shall be without prejudice to the prosecution of any incidents which may give rise to claims or claims which the parties may have against each other, and shall not require cooperation in the event of the same.
- Discrimination including Sexual Harassment. State and federal law, as well as University of Nebraska Bylaws, policies, and guidelines prohibit discrimination (as defined therein) including harassment and retaliation, against students, employees, and other members of University community. Prohibited types of discrimination include discrimination on the basis of race, color, ethnicity, national origin, sex (including sexual harassment), pregnancy, sexual orientation, gender identity, religion, disability, age, genetic information, veteran status, marital status, political affiliation, and any other protected status. Nebraska Medicine shall exercise control over itself, its employees, agents, contractors, and affiliated parties to prohibit acts of discrimination, including sexual harassment, against University students, employees, and other members of the University community. Nebraska Medicine shall cooperate with the University following any report of discrimination. In the event the University determines that Nebraska Medicine or an employee, agent, contractor, or other person affiliated with Supplier has engaged in discrimination, including harassment, or other inappropriate conduct, Nebraska Medicine will take prompt and effective action, in accordance with University's direction, to prevent recurrence of the conduct and to correct its effects, which may include removal of the employee, agent, contractor, or other person affiliated with Nebraska Medicine from providing Athletic Medicine Services. Nebraska Medicine's failure to comply with the University's directive or any other part of this provision may be cause for immediate termination of this Agreement. Nebraska Medicine acknowledges that University may have obligations to report any allegations or incidents of discrimination, including sexual harassment. Nebraska Medicine and its employees, agents,

contractors, and other persons affiliated with Nebraska Medicine who are directly providing the Athletic Medicine Services or present on University premises shall participate in any training as may be required by University from time to time, including training regarding sexual harassment.

- Criminal Background Investigations. Nebraska Medicine represents and warrants 24. that Nebraska Medicine has obtained, at its own expense and in a manner compliant with all applicable laws, a background screening for all of Physicians and any other personnel who will be on the premises of the NM Clinic. This provision does not include University employees leased to Nebraska Medicine under this agreement. Such background screenings shall be completed consistent with current industry standards and shall, at a minimum, include the same degree of thoroughness as the background checks Athletics conducts for its newly hired staff. Athletics shall provide to Nebraska Medicine a list of all background checks required. Nebraska Medicine agrees to update any background screening upon reasonable request by Athletics, it being agreed that any request based upon the occurrence of any illegal activity involving Nebraska Medicine or its personnel, or the reasonable suspicion of illegal activity would be deemed reasonable. Nebraska Medicine shall provide Athletics with evidence of the completion of the required background screenings upon Athletics' request. Nebraska Medicine shall not hire, retain or engage any individual directly involved in the performance of services under this Agreement who has been convicted (felony or misdemeanor) of or entered into a court-supervised diversion program for any sexual offense, felony assault (including domestic violence related incidents), child abuse, molestation or other crime involving endangerment of a minor, murder or kidnapping. Nebraska Medicine and its employees or agents directly performing services under this Agreement cannot be listed on any sex offender registry. Other convictions, such as misdemeanor assault, drug distribution activity, felony drug possession, and any other felony or crime involving moral turpitude may also render Nebraska Medicine and its employees or agents ineligible to directly perform services under this Agreement, taking into consideration (a) the nature and gravity of the offense(s), (b) the time that has passed since the offense or conduct and/or completion of the sentence, and (c) the nature of the services being performed. Nebraska Medicine agrees to ensure any third party with whom Nebraska Medicine engages to provide any part of the services provided under this Agreement agrees to the same restrictions, conditions, and requirements of this section in the same capacity as Nebraska Medicine.
- 25. <u>Work Status Verification</u>. Nebraska Medicine and any of its subcontractors shall use a federal immigration verification system to determine the work eligibility status of new employees physically performing services within the State of Nebraska pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 4-108 to 4-114.
- 26. <u>Nondiscrimination</u>. Neither Nebraska Medicine nor any of its subcontractors shall discriminate against any employee, or applicant for employment to be employed in the performance of this Agreement, with respect to hire, tenure, terms, conditions, or privilege of employment because of the race, color, religion, sex, disability, or national origin of the employee or applicant in accordance with the Nebraska Fair Employment Practice Act (Neb. Rev. Stat. §48-1122).
- 27. <u>Taxpayer Transparency Act.</u> Under Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 84-602.01 to 84-602.04, the University is required to provide the Nebraska Department of Administrative Services with a copy of each contract that is a basis for an expenditure of state funds, including any amendments

and documents incorporated by reference in the contract. Copies of all such contracts and documents will be published by the Nebraska Department of Administrative Services at https://statecontracts.nebraska.gov/. It shall be the sole responsibility of Nebraska Medicine (a) to notify the University of any requested redactions to the Agreement, any amendment to the Agreement, and any document incorporated by reference into the Agreement and (b) to indicate the legal basis for such requested redactions at the time of execution thereof. In addition, Nebraska Medicine shall defend any challenge to such redactions at its own expense. Nebraska Medicine's failure to request redactions to any contracts or documents released by the University under this section shall constitute a complete waiver of any and all claims for damages caused by any such release.

- 28. <u>Public Records.</u> Under Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 84-712 to 84-712.09, information or records of or belonging to the University regarding, related to, or part of the Agreement will be open to public inspection and copying unless exempted from disclosure in accordance with the University's interpretation and application of applicable law. It shall be the sole responsibility of Nebraska Medicine (a) to notify the University of requested redactions to any such information or records that may otherwise be required to be open to public inspection and copying and (b) to indicate the legal basis for such requested redactions. In addition, Nebraska Medicine shall defend any challenge to such requested redactions at its own expense. Nebraska Medicine's failure to request redactions to any information or records released by the University under this section shall constitute a complete waiver of any and all claims for damages caused by any such release.
- Debarment List. Nebraska Medicine certifies and warrants that it has not been 29. debarred, suspended, or declared ineligible as defined in the Federal Acquisition Regulation 48 CFR Ch.1 Subpart 9.4. Nebraska Medicine also certifies that Nebraska Medicine, its partners, directors, officers, employees, licensees, subcontractors, or agents have not been excluded or debarred or otherwise become ineligible to participate in federal health care programs pursuant to 42 USC § 1320a-7. The certification and warranty set forth in this section shall be an ongoing certification and warranty during the term of the Agreement, and Nebraska Medicine shall immediately notify the University of any change in the status of the certification and warranty set forth in this section. If Nebraska Medicine becomes excluded from federal health care program participation or placed on the Consolidated List of Debarred, Suspended, and Ineligible Contractors, the Agreement may be terminated immediately, for cause, by the University. If any partners, directors, officers, employees, licensees, subcontractors, personnel, or agents of Nebraska Medicine become excluded from federal health care program participation, such individual shall be removed from participating in the Agreement immediately. Failure by Nebraska Medicine to remove such excluded individual immediately shall provide the University the right to terminate the Agreement immediately for cause.

Exhibit B

Covered Athletic Medicine Services

Covered Athletic Medicine Services pursuant to this Agreement will be provided by primary care sports medicine physicians, orthopedic surgery physicians, neurosurgery physicians, family medicine physicians, athletic trainers, nutritionists, physical therapists, sports psychologists, and coordinators, or such other professions which may be necessary to carry out the Athletic Medicine Services. Covered Athletic Medicine Services will include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Clinic Operations. Nebraska Medicine will provide clinic coverage for Athletes from 8:30AM to 5PM Monday through Friday with reasonable closures or reduced hours on holidays, academic breaks, and summer, as mutually agreed. Nebraska Medicine will provide care to Athletes, including but not limited to:
 - a. treatment of acute illness and injuries,
 - b. concussion evaluation, management, and return to play decisions in coordination with neuropsychologists,
 - c. ordering of labs, x-rays, or other tests for evaluation and treatment,
 - d. pre-participation physicals and baseline testing, and
 - e. primary care and sports medicine evaluation and treatments, including treatment of acute orthopedic issues and non-operative orthopedic care.
- 2. Event Coverage. Nebraska Medicine will provide event coverage for Athletes where there is a high risk of injury (defined below) and when required by the NCAA or Big Ten Conference (or any successor governing body, membership organization, or other relevant authority). Such coverage may require Nebraska Medicine to travel to other locations to provide services when necessary and such travel will be reimbursed by Athletics. Event coverage to Athletes may include, but is not limited to, treatment of acute illness and injuries and return to play decisions.
 - High risk of injury events currently include: football, volleyball, wrestling, soccer, gymnastics (men's and women's), track and field (men's and women's), and baseball.
- 3. <u>After-hours Coverage</u>. Nebraska Medicine will ensure after-hours coverage for Athletics questions and emergencies.

Exhibit C

Employee Leasing

1. Lease of Employee Services.

- a. From time to time during the term of this Agreement, Athletics may lease to Nebraska Medicine or its affiliates, the services of those employees employed by Athletics as further identified in Exhibit C-1 attached hereto, as may be supplemented from time to time (hereafter the "Leased Employee(s)").
- b. The Leased Employees shall devote up to the FTE noted in Exhibit C-1 attached hereto of his or her regular work hours to Nebraska Medicine and Leased Employee services will include providing operational support within the Leased Premises when requested by Nebraska Medicine providers. Any duties and functions performed outside the Leased Premises will be pursuant to his or her role as a University employee.
- c. The Leased Employees shall report to Nebraska Medicine to the extent their services relate to Nebraska Medicine and shall comply with all applicable Nebraska Medicine policies and procedures. Nebraska Medicine shall have the sole right to define and redefine job duties, establish schedules and staffing plans, assign and reassign tasks of work, and otherwise supervise the Leased Employees' work, so long as such actions are reasonably consistent with the respective job category, licensure, training and experience of the Leased Employees. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Nebraska Medicine and Athletics shall mutually agree upon the schedule for Leased Employees to provide services to Nebraska Medicine.
- d. Nebraska Medicine shall apply its policies governing workplace conduct and performance standards to the Leased Employees.
- e. Any disputes between Athletics and Nebraska Medicine regarding the qualifications, acceptability, placement or discipline of a Leased Employee shall be resolved through communication between Athletics and Nebraska Medicine unless otherwise stated in the Agreement or this Exhibit C; provided, however, Nebraska Medicine reserves the right to suspend or remove any Leased Employee from access or services in the event that such Leased Employee's conduct is deemed in Nebraska Medicine's discretion to be objectionable or detrimental to the Athletic Medicine Services or the proper administration of the NM Clinic.
- f. Athletics shall have the sole discretion as to the employee benefits to be provided and compensation to be paid to the Leased Employees in accordance with

- Athletics' policies. In addition, Athletics retains the sole right to terminate a Leased Employee.
- g. For purposes of classifying the Leased Employees under the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, the Leased Employees shall function as members of Nebraska Medicine's workforce when providing services under this Agreement and be subject to Nebraska Medicine's policies and procedures related to privacy and security of protected health information under HIPAA. Access to such records may be audited by Nebraska Medicine and any Leased Employee's unauthorized access, entry, or inappropriate use may result in the termination of Leased Employee's access and services pursuant to this Agreement, in Nebraska Medicine's sole discretion.
- 2. <u>Responsibilities of Athletics</u>. With respect to all the Leased Employees rendering services under this Exhibit C, Athletics agrees as follows:
 - a. Athletics shall pay all the Leased Employees' wages and benefits, administer benefit programs, withhold and remit income and payroll taxes, and maintain all records in connection therewith.
 - b. Athletics shall maintain all employee benefit programs in effect for the Leased Employees.
 - c. Athletics shall be responsible for any termination of a Leased Employee.
 - d. Athletics shall provide worker's compensation coverage of the Leased Employees, in an amount and form not less than that required by the law of the State of Nebraska.
 - e. Athletics shall comply with all local, state and federal applicable employment laws.
 - f. Athletics shall ensure that all Leased Employees satisfactorily complete all requirements listed on Nebraska Medicine's current non-employee onboarding checklist.
- 3. <u>Responsibilities of Nebraska Medicine</u>. With respect to all Leased Employees rendering services under this Agreement, Nebraska Medicine agrees as follows:
 - a. Nebraska Medicine shall provide the Leased Employees with any required orientation and supplemental training Nebraska Medicine wishes its staff to have, including but not limited to training Leased Employees concerning Nebraska Medicine's employee and patient privacy and safety policies and procedures.
 - b. Nebraska Medicine shall notify Athletics promptly of any significant performance or conduct problems involving a Leased Employee and cooperate fully with

- Athletics in discussing and documenting any such problems, resolving such problems, and defending any claims or lawsuits by a Leased Employee.
- c. Nebraska Medicine shall be solely responsible for causing the Leased Employees to carry out their duties, including as necessary for Nebraska Medicine to comply with all applicable legal, regulatory, and accreditation standards.
- d. Nebraska Medicine shall comply with all local, state and federal applicable employment laws.

EXHIBIT C-1

LEASED EMPLOYEES

The Athletics Healthcare Administrator ("AHA") will communicate staffing changes as they occur including notifying Nebraska Medicine immediately of any employees who will no longer be providing services so their system access can be terminated. When such staffing changes occur, Exhibit C-1 may be subject to automatic amendment; provided, however, that Athletics shall send Nebraska Medicine an updated Exhibit C-1 when such transitions occur, and provided further that Nebraska Medicine shall have and maintain the right to object to any Leased Employee assigned. AHA will work with Nebraska Medicine to coordinate training for any new employees to be added to the list.

He honored Omaha leader and philanthropist Carl Mammel, the inaugural winner of the Ruth and Bill Scott Medal for Lifetime Achievement in Philanthropy, recognizing his lifetime contributions to the University. He also honored the life of Dr. Phil Smith, a former professor at UNMC who left a lasting legacy for his work at the University.

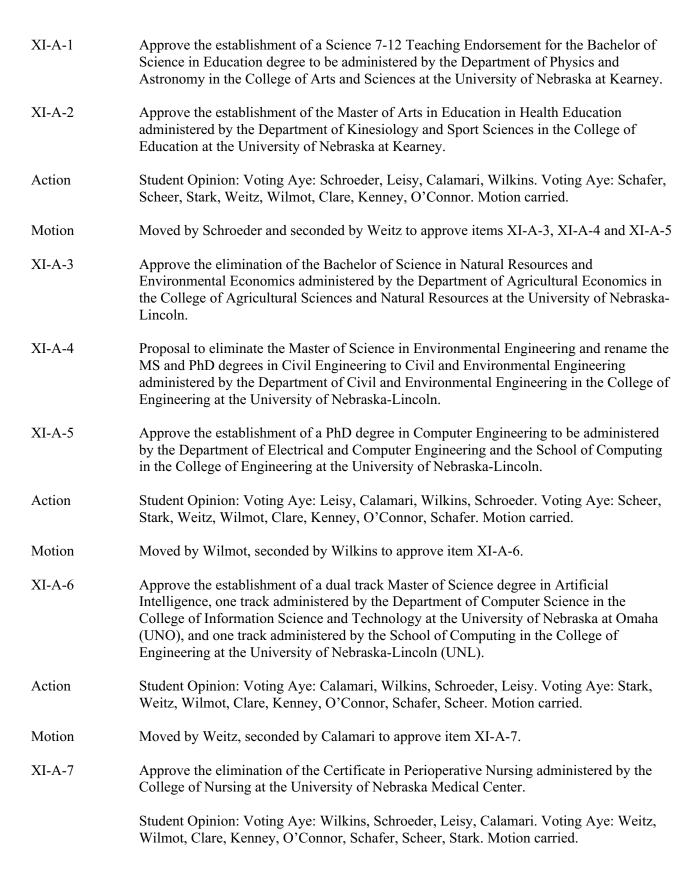
